

# City Manager's Message

In these unprecedented times, it is encouraged that we all create a family preparedness plan in the event a loved one is impacted by COVID-19. We're often reminded to plan for emergencies like earthquakes and fires, but planning before and during a pandemic is just as critical.

So what does a pandemic plan look like? For starters, parents and caregivers should identify trusted family members, friends or neighbors who may be able to take care of children if the parent or caregiver is diagnosed with COVID-19 and requires hospitalization or isolation. By taking some simple steps, families can help alleviate the stress of an unforeseen health emergency and ensure their loved ones are cared for.

Here are some important things to consider when putting together a family plan:

Create an alternate caregiver list. Set up a roster of trusted adults who can

step in to provide childcare, being mindful of the unique circumstances surrounding COVID-19. Choose individuals who are not high-risk and who would be able to accommodate an isolation area, should your child need it. Discuss the plan ahead of time with these individuals.

Prepare documents. Write a letter authorizing your designated caregiver to seek medical treatment for your child, if necessary. Make copies of insurance cards and other important medical documents your


alternate caregiver may need.

Write down special instructions. Be sure to leave a "need-to-know" list for your caregiver. This list may include information such as food allergies, needed medication, nutritional needs or limitations, or any other habits or routines that may help

Create a kid-friendly "go bag." Being separated from a parent or loved one can cause stress and anxiety for children. Pack a bag with some overnight essentials and include a special note from you, a family photo, a favorite book or other personal item that may help comfort your child. Be sure to also pack essentials including toiletries and clothing.

# **County Issues Face Covering Guidance**

# ORANGE COUNTY HEALTH OFFICER ISSUES FACE COVERING RECOMMENDATION FOR ESSENTIAL BUSINESSES

The County of Orange Health Officer issued a recommendation strongly encouraging all employees

at essential businesses to wear a face covering while at work and all residents engaged in essential activities outside the home to do the same.

The recommendation is in line with public health guidance issued by the California Department of Public Health on April 1, and is intended to help slow the spread of COVID-19 by those who are asymptomatic.

A face covering is material that covers the nose and mouth. It can be secured to the head with ties or straps, or simply wrapped around the lower face. Face coverings may be factory-made, as well as folded or sewn, and can be improvised using household items like scarfs, T-shirts,



sweatshirts or towels. Face coverings are an additional tool but they are not a substitute for proven protective measures like frequent hand washing, keeping your hands away from your face, practicing social distancing and staying home. Videos and information on face coverings can be found at:

Making Face Masks and Face Covers on Everyone

The City of Fullerton Strongly Encourages All Businesses to have their employees wear face coverings and gloves per the guidance.

Additionally, all residents should wear face coverings in public as an additional layer of protection. You must continue to wash your hands frequently and practice social distancing.

All City Parks are CLOSED for Social Gathering purposes. No picnics or organized sports are allowed. Passive use for walking, running, and relaxing are allowed.



During the COVID-19 pandemic, the City Council and all City Commissions/Committees will conduct meetings via video conferencing, per exemptions allowed under the Governor's Executive Order N-29-20. Council meetings are also broadcast live on <a href="mailed-channel3">Channel 3</a>, which can now be streamed online.

The City Council met on April 17th with Regular session beginning at 6:30pm and concluded at approximately 8:00pm. Closed Session began at the conclusion of Regular session.

Police Chaplain Jason Phillips gave the invocation via video message. Council Member Zahra led the Pledge of Allegiance.

There were no presentations.

There was one written public comment seeking clarification on the tree grant.

The City Manager addressed the current health issue associated with COVID-19 and how it is impacting the City in a fiscal capacity. The fiscal presentation can be found <a href="here">here</a>. Next week the City will begin hosting a weekly WebEx Meeting with the Small Business Development Council to aid in the economic crisis the City is facing to the pandemic. Information will be posted on the City's website. He also stated staff will look into the size, type and placement of trees and identify those that will be included in the Urban Forestry Master Plan.

The Consent Calendar was approved unanimously.

## Public Hearing Item:

 Fullerton Municipal Code Amendments Pertaining to Accessory and Junior Accessory Dwelling Units. This item was approved unanimously.

#### Regular Business Item:

 Resolution of Intention to Title 15 Amendment for Off-Site Advertising (Billboards). This item was approved unanimously.

The City Council held Closed Session for one anticipated litigation item. Regarding a previous existing litigation item, the City Attorney reported out in the matter of Michael Ramos vs New Cal Corp., et.al. (Closed Session on March 17, 2020) that the Council unanimously approved settlement in the amount of \$125,000 (moved by Fitzgerald, seconded by Silva).

# **Beckman Building** — Historic Preservation Award


# <u>Beckman Administration Building submitted for the Office of Historic Preservation 2020 Governor's</u> <u>Historic Preservation Awards</u>

The Community and Economic Development Department, supported by Fullerton Heritage, has nominated the Beckman Instruments, Inc. Administration Building for the California Office of Historic Preservation 2020 Governor's Historic Preservation Awards. Established in 1986, the Awards are presented annually to projects, individuals, and organizations whose contributions demonstrate significant achievement is preserving the heritage of California.

The entire Beckman campus, located just north of Imperial Highway on Harbor Boulevard, sat vacant from 2010 to 2017 until Newport Beach-based developer Western Realco received approval to construct a multi-building business park including a restored Beckman Administration Building. A.J. Kirkwood and Associates, an electrical engineering and construction firm based out of Tustin, was looking for a new location for its corporate headquarters and purchased the Beckman Building while still under repair. The Beckman building was completed in August 2019 with A.J. Kirkwood employees moving into their new headquarters by December 2019.

The restoration and reuse of the Beckman Building is one of the most successful private-public collaborations in Fullerton's history. Without the use of public funds or grants (City, State or Federal), the property owner completed a successful construction project; local preservationists retained a building important to the development to the city through adaptive reuse; A.J. Kirkwood created a beautiful new headquarters

# Trash Services Update

In conjunction with the City, Republic Services is working hard to ensure the highest quality customer service and minimal service disruption during the COVID-19 situation. The recent surge in residential waste and unique challenges require Republic Services to temporarily modify their service offerings to keep our community clean and safe.

Please see the following guidelines from Republic Services, effective Monday, March 30:

We will accept cart contents only. Drivers will <u>not be</u> authorized to leave their vehicle to pick up waste outside of the cart. Thus, please keep all trash inside of the cart to be picked up.

Bulk and e-waste programs will be suspended.

Curbside recycling and yard waste collection services WILL remain in place.

Move non six day/week commercial accounts to week day service (Mon-Fri).

We may need to use alternative disposal methods if there are disruptions to recycling processing capabilities or if recycling contamination increases. It's important to keep waste out of your recycling container.

## **Water Division Updates**

## Meter Shop

Meter Shop staff perform meter reading duties and respond to service calls during normal hours of operation and callouts after hours. In addition, they also turn water services on or off based on residents' needs, post water service accounts, replace water meters, water meter boxes/lids and perform repairs/tests on

water meters.

#### Water Distribution

This division is responsible for the maintenance of the water transmission and distribution system that delivers water to City residents, businesses, and industries. The water transmission and distribution system consists of 430 miles of water pipeline, more than 31,500 metered services, 4,000 fire hydrants, and 12,000 valves. On an annual average, we respond to 4,600 underground service alert tickets.

# Water Division Updates (cont.)

On April 5th, Water Division personnel responded to a water main break at 324 N. Basque Avenue. The standby team crew leader assisted with isolating the section of the water main that was leaking. Once the water main was shut down, the crew leader called out members of the Water Division construction crew to initiate the repairs. To make the repair, 115 inches of 12-inch diameter ductile iron water main was installed. The excavation was backfilled and temporary asphalt was installed. Permanent asphalt will be installed as soon as possible.



## **Water Production**

Staff performs a variety of field lab sampling as required by the State of California. This includes water samples from our wells, reservoirs and water distribution system. Control valves and plug valves regulate water between different pressure zones or elevations within the water system and require preventative maintenance (PM). Well production is a total of gallons produced from City water wells, and MWD production gallons reflect water purchased from Metropolitan Water District.


#### Kids Count, Too
