

## **Governor Orders Face Coverings in Public**

Governor Newsom issued a new order which mandates the use of face coverings statewide. The <u>new guidance document</u> from the California Department of Public Health, states that people shall wear a face covering, with some exceptions, when they are in a public setting and cannot maintain a social distance from another non family member. The City's Face Covering requirement is still in effect for all employees of open businesses and patrons, but the State mandate is more expansive by requiring face coverings in public spaces and outdoor settings, as described.

The City Council joined the North Orange County Chamber of Commerce to officially cut the ribbon for outdoor dining on Wilshire Avenue, west of Harbor. Restaurants are encouraged to expand outdoor dining due to reduced indoor dining occupancies based on State social distancing guidelines. ## Republic Services to institute CPI and Tip fee increase for Residential Service

Effective July 1st, the City's contract waste hauler, Republic Services, will be increasing rates due to an annual Consumer Price Index (CPI) increase and increased County landfill tipping/gate fees. Republic will adjust the fees charged for the residential, commercial and industrial service components by a CPI factor of 1.95% and pass on the increase of 1.77% for the Orange County landfill disposal gate fee charge. The base residential bill will increase from \$22.53 to \$22.96, or .43 cents. Based on the methodology of factoring in the increases, the net increase to a residential refuse bill is 1.91%. The City Manager gave updates on various items to include clarification on funding issues surrounding the Fullerton Museum.

There were no Appointments made.

# The June 16, 2020 City Council was held in the City Council Chambers.

Social Distancing and Face Covering requirements are in effect for members of the public. Limited public capacity is available in the Council Chambers and the Library Conference Room was set up for overflow. In person Public Comments were allowed but e-comments and emailed comments were highly encouraged.

#### The Consent Calendar:

- Reaffirmation of City's Commitment to Anti-Discrimination and Equitable Communities. This item was pulled, discussed, and after small changes approved.
- West Coyote Hills—Grant Award for Property Acquisition. This item was pulled and discussed. The item was approved unanimously.
- Surplus Property Declaration for 1600 West Commonwealth Avenue, 799 Rolling Hills Drive, 3151 North Euclid Street and Parcel No. 280-016-07 Bastanchury Tree Farm). This items was pulled and discussed, two of the properties - 799 Rolling Hills Drive and Parcel No. 280-016-07 Bastanchury Tree Farm, continued to a future date pending additional information as requested. The other two items were approved.

The remainder of the Consent Calendar items were approved unanimously.

There were two Public Hearing Items.

- Fullerton Municipal Code Amendments Pertaining to Regulations of Short-Term Rentals (continued from June 2,2020). This item was approved unanimously to be continued to the July 21, 2020 meeting. The reason was that the overall agenda was heavy on items and the Mayor wanted to move it to a meeting where more time could be provided.
- Fiscal Year 2019-20 Annual Action Plan Amendment 2 to Create Emergency Rental Assistance Program. This item, based on the Community Development Citizens Committee recommendation, was approved unanimously. This action moved \$300,000 from an action previously approved for business assistance to short term rental assistance to assist lower-income persons with immediate rental assistance. The business assistance program will received additional money from the County of Orange under a program funded through Supervisor Doug Chaffee's office.

#### Regular Business Items:

- Pavement Management Plan Status and Update. This item was an update on the City's condition of roads and was presented by the City's Senior Civil Engineer, David Grantham. This was a receive and file report.
- Establishment of Infrastructure Fund with Automatic Deposit of Revenues, Above a Baseline, for Designated Infrastructure Improvements. This item was the First Reading of an ordinance which establishes an Infrastructure Fund into which revenues from property tax and sales tax, above a baseline amount, would be automatically deposited. This was a request by the City Council when the INRAC committee presented options on March 3rd to help improve our infrastructure, specifically streets and roads. The ordinance is designed to capture funds going forward, regardless of whether there are new revenue sources, in order to make sure more current funding is dedicated to infrastructure maintenance and improvements.
- Professional Towing Services Request for Proposal. This item awarded a franchise to Anaheim Fullerton Tow for all Police initiated tows. The Council further requested that two additional respondents be re-evaluated in 6 months.
- Aid Agreement and Memorandum of Understanding for Exchange of Fire, Rescue and Emergency Medical Services Between City of Placentia and City of Fullerton (continued from June 2, 2020). This item was approved as an automatic aid agreement with the City of Placentia on a 3-2 vote (Zahra, Silva opposed). The automatic aid agreement provides for automatic dispatching of units for emergency calls based on the concept of nearest unit available. Based on data from Metro Net, there were 331 calls for service into Placentia from Fullerton in 2019. That is out of 13,272 total calls for service by FFD. Of those, 282 were for medical and 33 were fire related, 15 were other emergency, and one was for a hazardous materials response. OCFA calls into Fullerton were fewer. The agreement requires that we carefully monitor the calls and make 90 reports as well as have the ability to terminate the agreement with 60 days notice.

## **Water Division Updates**

#### **Meter Shop**

Meter Shop staff perform meter reading duties and respond to service calls during normal hours of operation and callouts after hours. In addition, they also turn water services on or off based on residents' needs, post water service accounts, replace water meters, water meter boxes/lids and perform repairs/tests on water meters.

#### **Water Production**

Staff perform a variety of field lab sampling as required by the State of California. This includes water samples from our wells, reservoirs and water distribution system. Control valves and plug valves regulate water between different pressure zones or elevations within the water system and require preventative maintenance (PM). Well production is a total of gallons produced from City water wells, and MWD production gallons reflect water purchased from Metropolitan Water District.

#### **Water Distribution**

This Division is responsible for the maintenance of the water transmission and distribution system that delivers water to City residents, businesses, and industries. The water transmission and distribution system consists of 430 miles of water pipeline, more than 31,500 metered services, 4,000 fire hydrants, and 12,000 valves. On an annual average, we respond to 4,600 underground service alert tickets.




## **Senior Services**

The Parks and Recreation Department is **STILL CONNECTING & SERVING** our senior community.

Senior services during COVID-19 include: Meals on Wheels OC food distribution and home delivery, grocery box distribution, Senior Buddies Program in partnership with Fullerton Free, emergency feeding assistance, and regular wellness reassurance calls to our community members. The mission of the program is to bring families and seniors together through caring connections. These small acts of kindness and service can bring sunshine into the lives of older adults who are isolated during this difficult time. We will retrieve your books from the library shelves and follow up with you to arrange a pickup time at the library.

- When you arrive at your scheduled time, please pull into one of the marked Curbside Pickup Slots. Please call the Circulation desk and staff will come out with your items (the phone number will be displayed by the pickup area).



## DID YOU KNOW...

## Early Fullerton History

In spring of 2001, brightly colored life-size sheep started appearing around downtown. The outdoor art exhibit, dubbed Bastanchury Days, was initiated by the Chamber of Commerce and sponsored by local merchants and organizations.
