City Manager's Message

Fullerton Adopts Annual Operating Budget for Fiscal Year 2020-21

On Tuesday, June 2nd, the City Council adopted a \$240.4 million dollar balanced operating budget. The FY 2020-21 Proposed General Fund budget will total \$106.1 million in expenditures and will be supported by \$98.2 million in revenues and \$7.9 million in proposed budget reduction measures. In order to balance the projected \$7.9 million General Fund operating deficit for FY 2020- 21, Staff identified and presented a number of different budget balancing options.

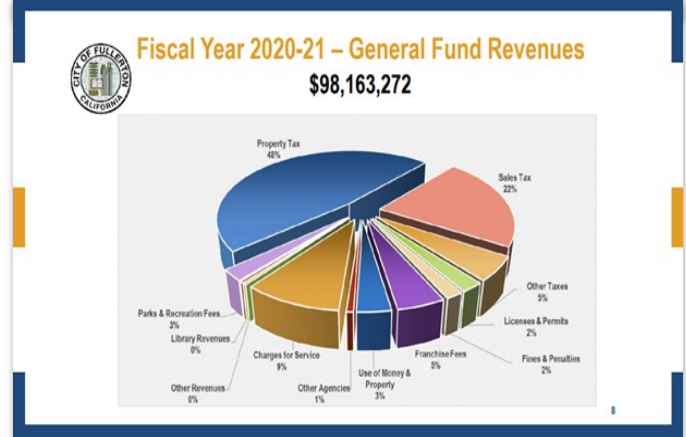
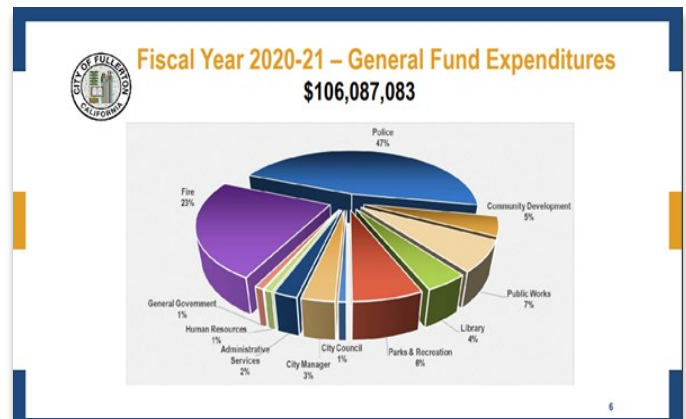
A few of these options include:

- * Non-Regular Employee Separations – \$1.3 million
- * Vacancy Savings - \$2.9 million
- * Temporary Closure of the Museum – \$588,000
- * Reducing the Library's hours open to the public from 61 to 34 Hours - \$206,000
- * Negotiated Labor Savings and Executive Team Salary reduction of 10% - \$2.8 million

It is important to note that as the fiscal year proceeds, City staff and City Council will continuously monitor revenues and expenditures. A thorough review of the City's professional services and other cost reductions in operations will be presented to the City Council for consideration. The City will also work to identify potential new revenue sources.

Fullerton Museum Operations for FY 20-21

The City Council's action related to the Museum does not defund or permanently close the Museum. At this time, the three full-time Museum staff will continue working under the Parks and Recreation Department and be tasked with helping position the Museum for future operations to include working on a Master Plan, plan specific events at the Museum, and work with the Museum Association on its mission. The Association was incorporated in 1971 when it was the Museum Association of North Orange County. The City has applied for CARES Act funding to assist with operations at the Museum and is planning to conduct a Master Plan process.

Distance Learning through Spectrum

CITY COUNCIL MEETING REVIEW

During the COVID-19 pandemic, the City Council and all City Commissions/Committees may conduct meetings via video conferencing, per exemptions allowed under the Governor's Executive Order N-29-20. All agendas can be found online by clicking [here](#). Comments on agenda items can be e-mailed before the meeting to cityclerksoffice@cityoffullerton.com. Council meetings are also broadcast live on [Channel 3](#), Facebook Live, and streamed online.

The June 2, 2020 City Council was held in the City Council Chambers.

Social Distancing and Face Covering requirements were in effect for members of the public.

Limited public capacity was available in the Council Chambers and the Library Conference Room was set up for overflow. In person Public Comments were allowed but e-comments and emailed comments were highly encouraged.

The City Council met on June 2nd with Closed Session beginning at 5:00pm, and Regular session beginning at 6:30pm and concluded at approximately 1:05 am on June 3rd.

Police Chaplain John Schaefer gave the invocation. Council Member Zahra led the Pledge of Allegiance.

There was no report out from the City Attorney on Closed Session items.

There were no presentations made.

There were approximately 10 public comments regarding Museum operations, beauty salon license denial, safety hazard of weeds on City trails, illegal fireworks, racial justice, and gratitude expressed for City Council and staff's participation in the community.

There were e-comments submitted regarding opposition to agenda item #2 (Fullerton Municipal Code Amendment Pertaining to Amending State Speed Limits—Second Reading of Ordinance) and enforcement of speeding on City streets.

The City Manager welcomed a new employee and gave updates on the weed issue on City trails and staff will look into the issue, residents with knowledge of illegal fireworks should report them via email to Chief of Police Bob Dunn at bdunn@fullertonpd.org. The 2020 Census has been delayed but it remains an important issue. Staff will look into permanent cosmetics businesses as being included with personal services in a zoning ordinance amendment.

The following Commission / Committee / Board appointment was made: Mayor Fitzgerald appointed Chris Thompson to the Community Development Citizens' Committee. The appointment passed unanimously.

Consent Calendar Items:

- ◇ Item #4: Monthly Legislative Update. This item was pulled and discussed. The item passed 4-1 (Whitaker opposed).
- ◇ Item #5: Automatic Aid Agreement for Exchange of Fire, Rescue and Emergency Medical Services between the City of Placentia and City of Fullerton. This item was pulled and discussed. A motion was made to continue the item until the MOU is discussed and brought back to the City Council for its consideration. The item passed 3-2 (Whitaker and Fitzgerald opposed).

The remainder of the consent calendar was approved unanimously.

Public Hearing Items:

- Fullerton Municipal Code Amendments Pertaining to Regulation of Short-Term Rentals (continued from May 5, 2020). This item was continued to the June 16, 2020, City Council Meeting.

Regular Business Items:

- Literacy and Cultural Innovation Programming Partnership, Hunt Branch Library Proposal Recommendation. This item was approved 5-0.
- Eviction Moratorium Extension Request. This item was tabled (not acted upon) due to the Governor extending the time line for the State moratorium. The City of Fullerton will follow the Governor's Executive Order which is in place and extends the eviction moratorium from May 31, 2020 to July 28, 2020.
- Request for Sixty Day Rent Freeze due to Covid-19 Public Health Crisis. Direction was provided to staff to provide rental assistance options and bring back to the City Council at a future meeting and also have Code Enforcement staff conduct an inspection of the Palm Gardens Apartments. This item was approved 3-2 (Whitaker and Fitzgerald opposed).
- Award of Professional Services for Communication and Outreach Efforts. On a unanimous vote, this item was continued to June 16, 2020.
- Policies and Procedures for Evaluating Transportation Impacts and Effects in Response to SB 743 (2013). On a unanimous vote, this item was continued to June 16, 2020.

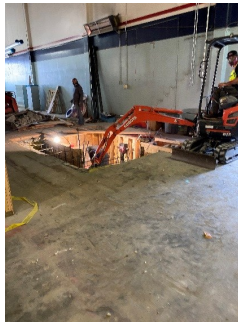

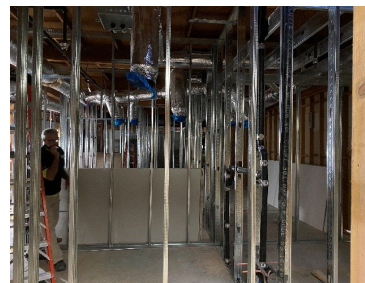

Water Division Updates

Meter Shop

Meter Shop staff perform meter reading duties and respond to service calls during normal hours of operation and callouts after hours. In addition, they also turn water services on or off based on residents' needs, post water service accounts, replace water meters, water meter boxes/lids and perform repairs/tests on water meters.

Water Production

Staff performs a variety of field lab sampling as required by the State of California. This includes water samples from our wells, reservoirs and water distribution system. Control valves and plug valves regulate water between different pressure zones or elevations within the water system and require preventative maintenance (PM). Well production is a total of gallons produced from City water wells, and MWD production gallons reflect water purchased from Metropolitan Water District.

Water Distribution

This Division is responsible for the maintenance of the water transmission and distribution system that delivers water to City residents, businesses, and industries. The water transmission and distribution system consists of 430 miles of water pipeline, more than 31,500 metered services, 4,000 fire hydrants, and 12,000 valves. On an annual average, we respond to 4,600 Underground Service Alert tickets.

Water Leak

On May 27th, a crew from the Water Construction section responded to 2030 Conejo Lane to repair a Water Main Break. The repair crew utilized a clamp that allowed them to reconnect to the existing one-inch copper water service. The excavation was backfilled and cold mix asphalt was installed to allow vehicular traffic to utilize the roadway. Our Street Division will install hot asphalt as soon as possible.

Street Improvements

Rehabilitation of Brea Boulevard from Bastanchury Road to the northerly City limits was recently completed. The improvements included repair of damaged sidewalk and curb and gutter, new driveway approaches and new curb ramps. Street pavement was rehabilitated by a 3" full width grind and overlay. The complete intersection of Brea and Bastanchury was also included. The project was coordinated with the City of Brea.

Senior Services, Museum Center & Pooch Park

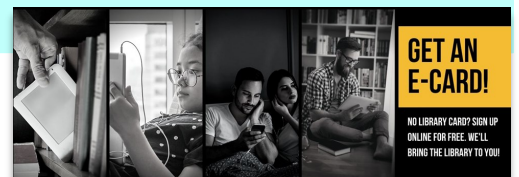
