## City Manager's Message

May 28, 2020

### Fullerton—Open for Business! (Mostly)

Businesses of all sorts are slowly re-opening. But as confusing as it has been for business owners and their employees to know when to open and how to open, it is equally confusing for residents to understand how things are progressing as we slowly emerge from the Stay at Home orders. First, the City is not able to determine when businesses or organizations are able to open and under what guidance. Unfortunately, as with many small, medium, and even larger sized cities, we do not have a Health Officer and a Health Department which is empowered by law to make such determinations. In Orange County, there is only one Health Officer and that position is within the Orange County Health Care Agency. But it is the State, the California Department of Public Health - and specifically the Governor, who can use his powers to issue Executive Orders, that sets the health direction for the State and the County Health Officer follows the State direction.

The Governor has allowed the County of Orange to be fully in Stage 2 of his re-opening roadmap. The following business/organizations are open: Retail (both curbside and in-store); Restaurants (dine-in allowed); manufacturing; offices/professional; and limited personal services which includes barbershops and hair-salons. Places of worship are now also open with limits (25% of occupancy or 100 persons, which ever is lower).

Places not yet allowed to open include: nail salons, tattoo parlors, gyms, fitness studios, libraries, indoor museums, community centers, public pools, movie theaters, bars, nightclubs, festivals, hotels for leisure and tourism, higher education. ### Requirement for Face Coverings Explained

As part of allowing more businesses to re-open, the State and County now **require** Face Coverings. The general guide for when to wear a face covering is whenever you are in the public and cannot maintain social separation from non-family members, you are required to wear a face covering. Please remember, the ability of all people to now visit restaurants and businesses is part of re-opening and restoring our economy. This means that people in the high-risk category, such as seniors and people with underlying health conditions, are able to go out and do 'normal' things. However, the threat to their health has not gone away. By wearing a face covering you are helping all people enjoy being out and contributing to the restoration of our economy. So, do it for others.

**Effective 5-18-2020, bulk and e-waste programs are resumed. For services or to schedule pick-ups, please contact Republic Services at 714-238-3300.**

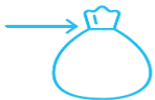
Orange County's four (4) [Household Hazardous Waste Collection Centers](#) are open and operating during normal business hours.

**Do** empty, clean and dry your recyclables.



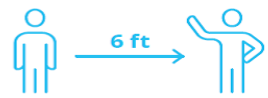
Residual liquids can carry viruses.

**Do** observe social distancing with our workforce.



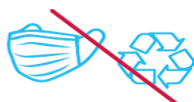
For the health and safety of our essential workers, please keep at least 6 feet of distance.

Direct the City Manager, in his capacity as the Director of Disaster Services, to extend until June 30, 2020 the temporary moratorium adopted through Ordinance No. 3279 on eviction of residential or commercial tenants unable to pay rent because of COVID-19; and/or

Provide staff direction on other matters related to tenant and landlord financial difficulties arising from the COVID-19 public health crisis after discussion by the City Council.

### Consideration of Sixty Day Rent Freeze due to Covid-19 Public Health Crisis

At the May 19, 2020 City Council meeting, Councilman Silva, seconded by Councilman Zahra, requested this item be brought back to provide Staff direction regarding enacting a rent increase moratorium to include, but not limited to an urgency ordinance or regular ordinance process, financial assistance for lower income tenants affected by rent increases, or other program which addresses rental increases during the Covid-19 public health crisis.

## Depot at FTC

The Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA) has completed the 'refresh' of the Depot at the Fullerton Transportation Center. Highlights include a fresh coat of paint on the canopies along with new lighting and signage consistent with the OCTA brand throughout the system. OCTA has indicated that buses will begin relocating from the temporary stop on the north side of Santa Fe back into the Depot starting Friday, May 22<sup>nd</sup>.

## Short-Term Rentals

**City Council Consideration of amendments to the Municipal Code pertaining to regulations Short-Term Rentals in the City** – At its meeting on June 2<sup>nd</sup> the City Council will consider amendments to the Fullerton Municipal Code regarding the City's regulations for Short-Term Rentals. The number of short-term rentals in Fullerton has grown substantially in the last 12 months, pre-COVID, to an estimated 400+ listings on 320 properties. These rentals range from individual bedrooms to entire homes and are dispersed throughout the city in various residential zones, but are predominantly in the Single-Family Residential (R-1) zones. The City's Code Enforcement Division monitors listings on short-term rental websites such as AirBnB, Homeaway, VRBO and others, but due to the lack of specific regulations for this use in the Municipal Code, if a complaint is received, enforcement actions are limited to nuisance activities that may be occurring on the property that are indirectly related to the short-term rental use. The most common nuisance activities related to short-term rentals are: noise, property maintenance and parking. City staff is recommending to amend the Municipal Code to allow short-term an approach which focuses on 3 primary goals:

- ◆ Goal #1 - Allow the use while protecting the residential character of neighborhoods
- ◆ Goal #2 - Create a mechanism for Code Enforcement to address bad operators
- ◆ Goal #3 - Ensure operators pay the proper taxes and licensing fees

To achieve these goals, the following regulations are proposed:

- ◆ Requirement to have smoke and carbon monoxide detectors installed consistent with California Building Code
- ◆ Provide an emergency exit plan for the home to all guests
- ◆ Obtain a Business License, Short-term Rental Permit and pay appropriate taxes
- ◆ Prohibit use of short-term rental for commercial event space (weddings, etc.)
- ◆ Posting of Good Neighbor Policies (trash, noise, property maintenance)
- ◆ Separation (buffers) between short-term rentals on a given street for properties used as "whole-home" rentals
- ◆ Notification to adjacent properties with contact information for complaints / issues arising from the use of the property as part of renewal process
- ◆ Prohibit on-site advertising
- ◆ Establish a revocation process for Short-term Rental Permit for bad operators

## Fullerton Municipal Airport

Airport staff responded to an aircraft excursion from Runway 24 on May 20<sup>th</sup>. The single engine aircraft overshot the runway and struck a fence on the west side of the airport. Fortunately, the pilot was not injured but the aircraft caused a hole in the chain link perimeter fence, as well as bending the fence support poles. Staff was able to patch the hole and utilized the tractor to pull the fence back into position.

## Meter Shop & Water Production Updates

### Meter Shop

Meter Shop staff perform meter reading duties and respond to service calls during normal hours of operation and callouts after hours. In addition, they also turn water services on or off based on residents' needs, post water service accounts, replace water meters, water meter boxes/lids and perform repairs/tests on water meters.

### Water Production

Staff perform a variety of field lab sampling as required by the State of California. This includes water samples from our wells, reservoirs and water distribution system. Control valves and plug valves regulate water between different pressure zones or elevations within the water system and require preventative maintenance (PM). Well production is a total of gallons produced from City water wells, and MWD production gallons reflect water purchased from Metropolitan Water District.

## Water Distribution Update & Water Main Break

### Water Distribution

This Division is responsible for the maintenance of the water transmission and distribution system that delivers water to City residents, businesses, and industries. The water transmission and distribution system consists of 430 miles of water pipeline, more than 31,500 metered services, 4,000 fire hydrants, and 12,000 valves. On an annual average, we respond to 4,600 underground service alert tickets.

The Parks and Recreation Department is **STILL CONNECTING & SERVING** our senior community.

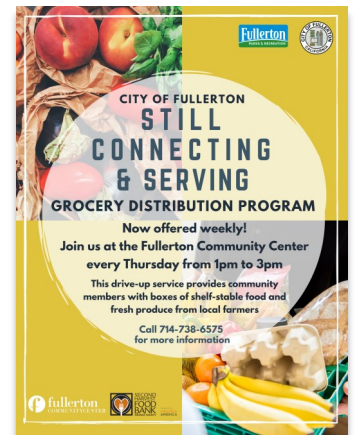

We will retrieve your books from the library shelves and follow up with you to arrange a pickup time at the library.

For your safety and the safety of library staff, please continue to follow personal protective guidelines, including social distancing, when using FPL's curbside pickup service, including these special instructions:

- When you arrive at your scheduled time, please pull into one of the marked Curbside Pickup Slots. Please call the Circulation desk and staff will come out with your items (the phone number will be displayed by the pickup area).

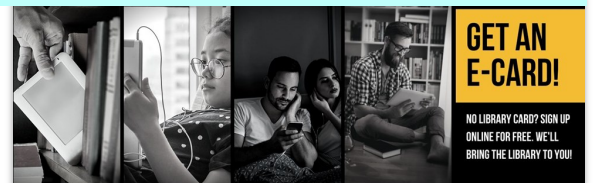
