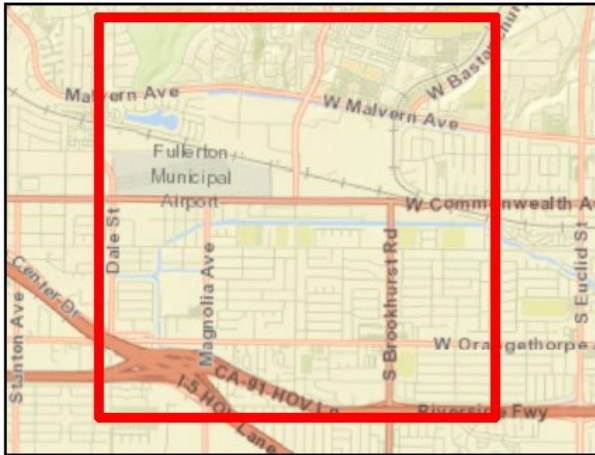

City Manager's Message

August 20, 2020

Spraying to Occur for Mosquitos that Transmit West Nile Virus 8-25 to 8-27

The Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District informed the City that they will be using truck-mounted sprayers in a portion of the City between the hours of 10 pm to 5 am on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, August 25 through 27. This is in response to a large number of West Nile Virus (WNV) positive mosquitos caught in traps in the area.



The District will provide door knob hangars and other information related to the spraying. More information can be obtained at <https://www.ocvector.org/residential-truck-mounted-treatments>.

Additionally on the District website, they have information about how best to prepare your house to prevent mosquito infestations and how to protect yourself when out and about from attracting mosquito bites.

Hot Weather is Here! How to Stay Cool, Fullerton!

Hot and humid weather struck all of California this week and it won't be the last of it that we will experience this year. The City is reading its plans for opening the Fullerton Community Center (or another center) as a Cooling Center if needed during the next heat wave when the demand is triggered, but there are many things you can do to stay cool in your house and while on the job. As a reminder, never leave infants, children, frail elderly, or pets unattended in a parked car. Drink plenty of fluids. Don't wait until you're thirsty. And, dress in lightweight, loose-fitting clothing. Use a hat and sunscreen as needed.

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BEAT the HEAT Heat waves are a leading cause of extreme weather-related deaths in the U.S.

Who's at RISK in EXTREME HEAT?

- Adults over 65, children under 4, people with existing medical conditions, and those without access to air conditioning

What can you DO?

Stay Cool

- Avoid direct sunlight
- Wear lightweight, light-colored clothing
- Keep home cool by turning on air conditioning or running fans
- Take cool showers or baths

Stay Hydrated

- Drink more water than usual
- Don't wait until you're thirsty to hydrate
- Avoid alcohol or liquids containing large amounts of sugar
- Remind others to drink enough water throughout the day

CITY COUNCIL MEETING REVIEW

During the COVID-19 pandemic, the City Council and all City Commissions/Committees may conduct meetings via video conferencing, per exemptions allowed under the Governor's Executive Order N-29-20. All agendas can be found online by clicking [here](#). Comments on agenda items can be e-mailed before the meeting to cityclerksoffice@cityoffullerton.com. Council meetings are also broadcast live on [Channel 3](#), Facebook Live, and streamed online.

The City Council met on August 18th with Closed Session beginning at 5:00pm, and Regular session beginning at 6:30pm and concluded at approximately 10:45 pm.

The City Attorney reported that an item of potential litigation based upon correspondence received August 13, 2020, from Friends From Fullerton Waterways, and this notice of potential litigation was received after the posting of the agenda and cannot wait until the next regular meeting. On a unanimous vote, this item was added to the closed session agenda.

Public comments were made on Closed Session items to include the Korean War Memorial.

Pastor Omar Rodriguez, Maple Church, gave the invocation. City Council Member Silva led the Pledge of Allegiance.

There was no report out from the City Attorney on Closed Session items. The City Attorney announced consideration to add an item to the agenda for the Side Letter of Memorandum of Agreement to the City of Fullerton and the Fullerton Management Association implementing a 5% earning reduction and was received after posting of the agenda and cannot wait until the next regular meeting. This item would be subject to a final review at the September 15 meeting. On a unanimous vote, this item was added to the regular session agenda.

The August 18, 2020 City Council was held in the City Council Chambers.

Social Distancing and Face Covering requirements were in effect for members of the public. Limited public capacity was available in the Council Chambers and we had additional overflow available. In person Public Comments were allowed but e-comments and emailed comments were highly encouraged.

There was one (1) presentation made. Citizens Academy Graduate Recognition. Graduates' names were announced and thanked for their participation.

There were e-comments made on opposition to short-term rentals, public safety personnel encouraged to wear masks, inquired to status of placing a water main from a northwest industrial site to channel water to golf course instead a walkway was placed, support on ASES Program, support extension of safe parking to help the homeless,

There were in-person public comments made on RFP for broadcasting services, homelessness resources, protocols related to opening cannabis shops, accolades given to the Fullerton Museum Center Foundation Board and volunteers who have donated their time and money to keep the Museum functioning, accolades given to the City Council allowing for collaboration for rental assistance given to the community, and a request for needed weed abatement in the safe parking zone.

The City Manager gave an update on safe parking issues and staff is reviewing other parking issues throughout the City. He stated the city is currently not enforcing for street sweeping or overnight parking but are enforcing for more than 72 hour parking and parking in front of fire hydrants, blue areas, red curbs, etc. A member of the public was thanked for thanking City staff at a recent event which assisted in the rental assistance program. Union Pacific Park ENA Agreement, in regard to Renewable Farms, will be brought back to City Council for further discussion. Also, new employee hires were announced. An update was given on the Covid-19 pandemic. Outdoor dining hours have been extended.

- Agreement with Tripepi Smith for Media and Broadcasting Services. This item was discussed and approved 4-1 (Whitaker opposed).
- First Consideration of a Proposed Side letter to Memorandum of Agreement Between City of Fullerton and Fullerton Municipal Employees Federation Regarding Pay for Canine Care. This item was discussed and approved unanimously.
- Resolution for Confidential / Non-represented Compensation and Implementing a 5% Earnings Reduction. This item was discussed and passed unanimously.
- Side Letter to Memorandum of Agreement Between the City of Fullerton and the Fullerton Management Association Implementing a 5% Earnings Reduction (item added to agenda). This item was discussed and passed unanimously.

In closing Mayor Fitzgerald read aloud a letter from the Fullerton Public Library Foundation (Foundation) which stated the Foundation closed escrow on the Bastanchury Property and as part of their agreement with the City, were presenting the City with a check for \$75,000 to help with Library technology issues. The Foundation thanked the City and staff for their assistance with the property sale. The property, adjacent to Beechwood School and fronting to Bastanchury Road, has already been entitled with plans to develop 33 for sale homes. 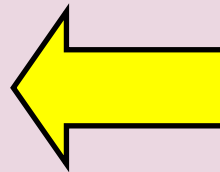

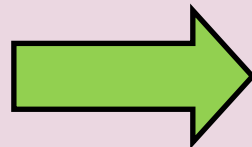

Hot Weather Pet Safety Tips

Never Leave Your Pet in the Car

Never leave your pet alone in a vehicle, even with the windows cracked; it only takes a few minutes for the temperature inside to reach 160 degrees. If you see an animal in a hot car, try to locate the owner or call 911!

Watch out for Hot Pavement

Don't leave your pet standing on the hot pavement and keep walks to a minimum. Remember, if it's too hot for bare feet, it's too hot for bare paws!

Always Provide Water & Shade

Bring your pet inside during the hot day and let them rest in a cool part of the house. Be sensitive to the needs of older, obese or short nosed dogs who are less tolerant of the heat and should be kept indoors in air-conditioning as much as possible.

Limit Exercise

Limit dog walks and exercise on hot days. Don't let playful pets overexert themselves in extremely warm weather. Exercise in the early morning and late evening to avoid the heat.

Watch for Signs of Heatstroke

Excessive panting, excessive drooling, high heart rate, discolored gums, mobility problems, high body temperature, vomiting and diarrhea. If your pet is experiencing these symptoms, contact your vet immediately!

Water Division Updates

Meter Shop

Meter Shop staff perform meter reading duties and respond to service calls during normal hours of operation and callouts after hours. In addition, they also turn water services on or off based on residents' needs, post water service accounts, replace water meters, water meter boxes/lids and perform repairs/tests on water meters.

Water Production

Staff perform a variety of field lab sampling as required by the state of California. This includes water samples from our wells, reservoirs and water distribution system. Control valves and plug valves regulate water between different pressure zones or elevations within the water system and require preventative maintenance (PM). Well production is a total of gallons produced from City water wells, and MWD production gallons reflect water purchased from Metropolitan Water District.

Water Distribution

This Division is responsible for the maintenance of the water transmission and distribution system that delivers water to City residents, businesses, and industries. The water transmission and distribution system consists of 430 miles of water pipeline, more than 31,500 metered services, 4,000 fire hydrants, and 12,000 valves. On an annual average, we respond to 4,600 underground service alert tickets.

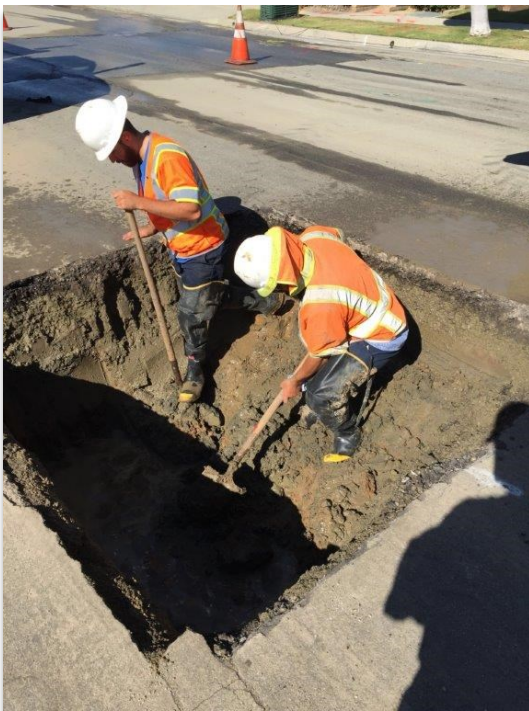

Water Repair & Water Quality

On August 12th, a construction crew from the Water Division responded to 1709 Island Drive to replace the existing leaking water service with new copper tubing material. Upon completion of the replacement project, the location was backfilled and secured awaiting the installation of new asphalt. On August 17th, the Street Division installed hot asphalt at this location.



Water Quality Specialist

The Water Quality Specialist monitors routine and main break bacteriological results and takes action if a positive sample is detected. Per California regulation, water services that present a hazard to the water supply are required to have a backflow prevention device to prevent polluted or contaminated water from entering the potable water system. These devices must be tested yearly to ensure they are in working order. The Water Quality Specialist is also responsible for water conservation complaints and assists in responding to billing disputes.

City's Urban Forest

Fullerton Receives \$377,000 Grant from CAL FIRE for the City's Urban Forest

The City of Fullerton has been awarded a CAL FIRE Urban and Community Forestry Grant to improve the City's urban forest. Through funds from California Climate Investment, the City has been awarded \$377,000 for the "City of Fullerton Urban

Forest Improvement Project." The project will conduct an inventory of city controlled trees and a tree canopy assessment.



These will be used to develop a long-term comprehensive urban forest management plan that will guide the city into the future. The community will be authentically engaged in the management planning process through surveys and community workshops. Five hundred trees will be planted and

maintained as part of the project, with a focus on disadvantaged communities. This project is the only Orange County city project awarded. The City will partner with its long-time contractor and private partner, West Coast Arborists (WCA) Inc. to implement the project.

Senior Services

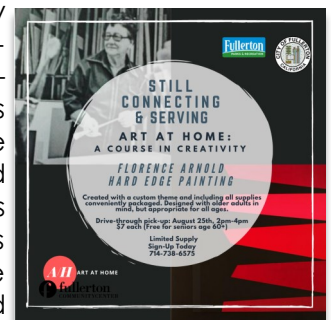
The Parks and Recreation Department is **STILL CONNECTING & SERVING** our senior community.

Senior services during COVID-19 include: Meals on Wheels OC food distribution and home delivery, grocery box distribution, Senior Buddies Program in partnership with Fullerton Free, emergency feeding assistance, and regular wellness reassurance calls to our community members. Through our partnerships, we have been able to provide 10,894 seniors with food and other essential services.

Art at Home: A Course in Creativity is the Fullerton Community Center's newest way to bring you educational art opportunities in the comfort of your own home. Courses are designed with older adults in mind, but are multi-generational and appropriate for all ages. Instructional guides and video tutorials are provided by the City's Education Coordinator. All courses are created with a custom theme and include all necessary materials/ supplies conveniently packaged. Art at Home is provided at no cost for older adults ages 60+. We are used to hearing about great artists who lived in Paris, Vienna, London, New York...but what about Fullerton? This week's Art At Home features the work of Fullerton's own modern master: Florence Arnold. Florence "Flossie" Arnold (1900—1994) was a pioneer of the abstract "hard edge" painting style of the 1960s and 70s. Born in Prescott, Arizona, Flossie moved to Fullerton as a young wife and taught music for 42 years. After retirement, she took up painting and became an internationally renowned figure in the art world. Here in Fullerton, she established "Night in Fullerton" and was also a founding member of the Muckenthaler Cultural Center. The Art at Home- Florence Arnold Hard Edge Painting course will be available for drive-through pick-up at the Fullerton Community Center on Tuesday, August 25th from 2pm to 4pm. Fullerton is full of interesting history, architecture, and unbelievable stories best discovered on foot. So leave the car at home and walk around Fullerton on these 30 minute guided walks hosted by Parks and Rec staff and knowledgeable community volunteers. You'll get your steps in and learn all sorts of Fullerton facts: some historical, some scientific, some random, some artistic, and some downright creepy! Put on your sneakers and join us!

The Community Center's newest program to keep seniors and others active will be up and running – or walking—in late August. **Fullerton on Foot** is a monthly guided walking tour of interesting sites around town, hosted by knowledgeable Parks and Rec staff and posted on the Community Center's You Tube Channel. 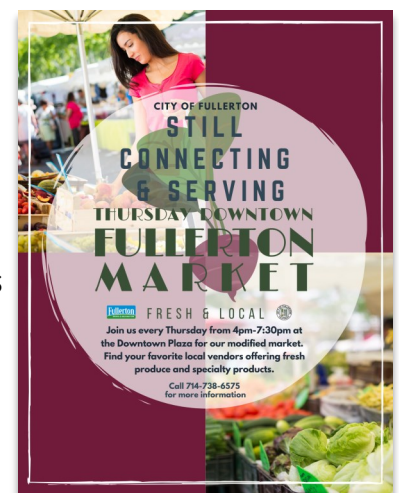

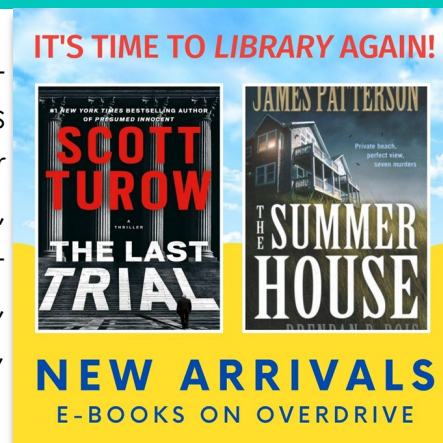

Remembering 1973, When Fullerton Built A Brand New Library!



In April 1970, voters approved formation of a joint powers authority to finance a new library adjacent to the recently constructed city hall on West Commonwealth. Building authority bonds in the amount of \$1.3 million were issued in February 1972, a construction contract was awarded in March, and groundbreaking ceremonies were held on April 5th. Construction of the split-level, 50,000 square foot facility took 14 months, and opened to the public on June 25, 1973 with 250,000 items available for checkout. A large sculptured panel "Prometheus Unbound" was gifted to the library for the opening by the Friends of the Library. Here's how it works: When you place items on hold, library employees will pull the available items from the shelves and process them for pickup. Once the hold becomes available, you will receive an automated notification by email or phone that the items are ready. You can also check your holds status online via your account at www.fullertonlibrary.org under the "Holds" tab in "My Account."

Once you have been notified that your items are ready, call the library Monday through Friday from 11:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m. at (714) 738-6333 to make an appointment to pick them up. You will have 14 days from the time of notice to pick up your materials. (If you can't call, send us an email at info@fullertonlibrary.org.)

Due to high demand, the library requires a minimum of two to three full business days to process requests. (During this time there may also be a slight delay in our ability to reach out to you by email or phone.) We ask you to be patient as we work hard to fulfill your requests while taking extra precautions, including quarantining returned books for 96 hours, to ensure your safety. Returns are not accepted during curbside pickup. To return your items, please use the outdoor book drop between Monday at 9:00 a.m. and Friday at 4:00 p.m.

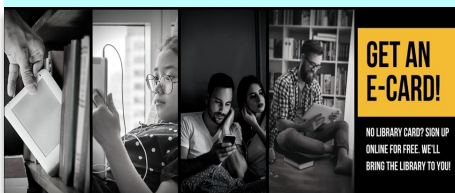

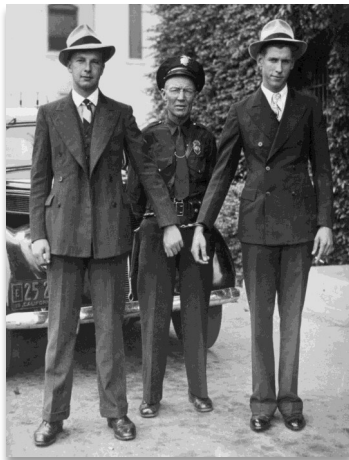
DID YOU KNOW...
