City Manager's Message

The Ballot Drop Boxes Are Coming!

The Orange County Registrar of Voters has begun placing Ballot Drop Boxes throughout the County in preparation for the transition to Vote Center voting beginning with the March 3, 2020 California Primary Election. The County will place five drop boxes in Fullerton in the following locations: Fullerton Fire Station #6; Fullerton Transportation Center; Fullerton Airport; Arirang Market (1701 Orangethorpe Avenue); and, Fullerton Junior College.



Every Orange County voter will soon receive a Vote By Mail ballot for the March 3, 2020 California Primary Election. Voters may return their ballot by mail, drop their ballot in any ballot drop box in Orange County starting February 3, 2020 or visit any Vote Center in Orange County to drop off their Vote By Mail ballot or vote their local ballot in person. Some Vote Centers (including the Vote Center at the Fullerton Public Library Conference Center) will open on February 22, 2020. The remaining Vote Centers will open February 29, 2020. Vote Centers will be open every day through, and including, Election Day to provide more convenience for the public to cast their vote. For more information, please go to

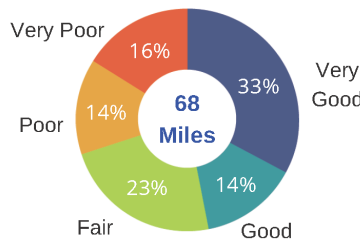

Stay tuned for more information as we bring more clarity to our pressing infrastructure issues during 2020.

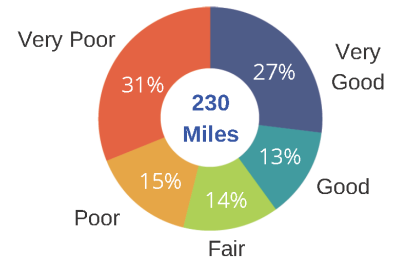
CITY OF FULLERTON Street Conditions Report Card

A look at Fullerton's street conditions and funding for street repairs.

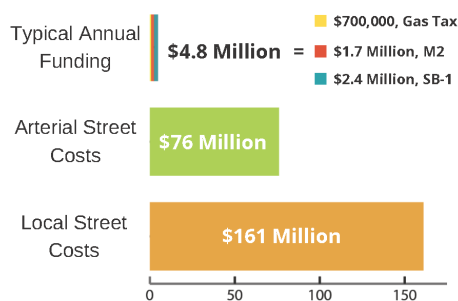
Condition of Arterial Streets



Condition of Local Streets



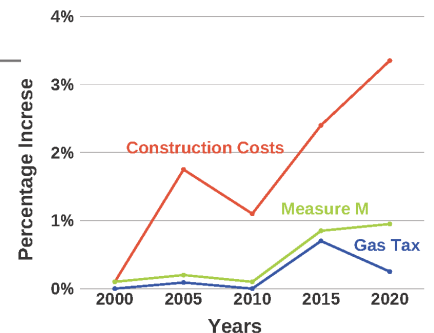
Funding vs Costs to Improve Streets to Good Condition

CITY COUNCIL MEETING REVIEW

The City Council met on January 7th with Closed Session beginning at 5:00 pm and Regular session beginning at 6:30pm and concluded at 8:05pm.

The City Council held a Closed Session and the City Attorney reported out a settlement in the case of Rosa Garcia De Reyes vs City of Fullerton, in which the City Council agreed to a settlement of \$57,500 and release of all other claims to close out the case.

Chaplain John Schafer, EV Free Church of Fullerton, conducted the invocation and Council Member Zahra led the Pledge of Allegiance.

There were three presentations.

- ◇ Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month. Ruthi Hanchett made a presentation and accepted a proclamation.
- ◇ Orangethorpe Elementary Teach Rock Program. Former Principal Randa Schmalfeld of Ladera Vista High School of the Arts made a presentation.
- ◇ Outgoing Commission Member. Mayor Fitzgerald and Council Member Zahra presented a certificate to outgoing member Brandon Whalen-Castellanos.

Approximately 7 members of the public made comments to include: Rancho La Paz Mobile Home Park, urban forestry, homelessness, illegal marijuana operations, Memorial Day program volunteers, and City Council rotation process.

The City Manager announced new employee hires, offered an apology and explanation of the telephone and computer system failure in the Utilities Division during the winter closure, gave an update on the homeless issue as it relates to the Safe Parking Program, and encouraged the public to inform the City if there is a suspicion of any type of illegal cannabis operation.

Appointments:

- Commission / Committee / Board Appointments. An appointment was made to the Library Board of Trustees, with the Council re-appointing Carl Byers. An appointment for Community Development Citizens' Committee will be continued to the January 21, 2020 meeting. This items was approved unanimously.

The Consent Calendar:

- Approval of 2019-20 All City Management Services, Inc. Contract for Crossing Guard Services. This item was pulled and discussed. This item was approved 4-1 (Flory opposed).
- Legal Services Agreement with Lewis Brisbois. This item was pulled by Staff for the purpose of moving it to the next meeting date. On a unanimous vote, this item will be brought back before the City Council for consideration at its next regularly scheduled meeting, January 21, 2020.
- Personnel Management System Change to Add Deputy Director of Community and Economic Development to Executive Resolution and Allow Appointment of Qualified Individual by City Manager on an Urgency Basis. This item was pulled and discussed. This item was approved 4-1 (Whitaker opposed).

The remainder of the Consent Calendar items was approved unanimously.

Regular Business Items:

- City Representation—Regional Advisory Bodies and Workgroups. Representatives were appointed. This item was approved unanimously.
- Third amendment to Solid Waste Handling Services Agreement between the City of Fullerton and Republic Services for Green Material as Alternative Daily Cover Mandate and Rate Increase. This item was approved unanimously.

The Mayor closed this meeting in remembrance and honor of former Mayor Don Bankhead.

New Residential Development

Planning Commission Approval of a 33-unit development at 751 Bastanchury Road

At its meeting on January 8th the Planning Commission voted to recommend that the City Council approve a new 33-unit residential development at 751 Bastanchury Road. The property is owned by the Fullerton Library Foundation and is located on the north side of Bastanchury Road, immediately south of Beechwood Elementary School. The required entitlements for this development include a General Plan Revision to change the Land Use Designation from Greenbelt Concept to Low-Medium Density Residential, a Zoning Amendment to change the zoning of the property from O-G to PRD-I (Planned Residential Development-Infill), a Tentative Tract Map for condominium purposes and Major Site Plan for review of site, architectural and landscape plans. The City Council will be the final decision-making body on this request, following the recommendation of approval by the Planning Commission. The City Council meeting to consider this project is anticipated for February 2020.

Organics Recycling

The City's commercial organics recycling program is gaining momentum! In May 2019, a letter introducing AB1826 Organics Recycling was sent out to targeted Fullerton businesses. Phone calls and emails were conducted to request sign-ups. In September 2019, Non-Compliant letters were mailed out to businesses and multifamily sites that had not yet signed up for Organics Recycling. Thirty-one (31) site visits were conducted in response to the Non-Compliance letters and over one hundred and twenty (120) sites were contacted via phone or email regarding Organics Recycling subscriptions. Fullerton's Organics Recycling program now has a total of **forty-eight (48)** subscriptions.



Commercial Organics Recycling

A state law, AB1826, requires businesses that generate a certain amount of organic waste to arrange for organic waste recycling. According to Cal Recycle, organic waste comprises 40 percent of the material in landfills.

The following chart shows the state-mandated implementation timeline of businesses generating one or more cubic yards of organic waste per week.

What is Organic Waste?
Organic waste includes food waste, food-soiled paper, landscape and pruning waste and non-hazardous wood waste.

Date	Generated Organic Waste
April 1, 2016	Businesses that generate 8 cubic yards or more of organic waste
January 1, 2017	Businesses that generate 4 cubic yards or more of organic waste
January 1, 2019	Businesses that generate 4 cubic yards or more of commercial solid waste (all garbage and at least 1 cubic yard of organic waste)

How Can My Business Comply with the State Regulation?
Donate surplus food to a food bank. Recycle food scraps (containers and services are provided by MG Disposal). Self-haul scraps to a composting facility.

The Law States:

La Ley Estipula:
To conserve diminishing landfill space and natural resources, California adopted Assembly Bill 2411, which sets a statewide recycling goal of 75% and mandates recycling in the commercial sector. Effective July 1, 2017, businesses that produce at least 4 cubic yards of trash a week must participate in recycling through one of the following:

- Subscribe to service that collects recyclables separately
- Send materials to a mixed waste processing facility that diverts recyclables
- Self-haul your own recyclables

EMPTY means making sure there is no food or product residue. Make sure all of that goes into the trash or down the drain as part of the EMPTY process.

CLEAN means that empty recyclable containers should be rinsed. No, no mustard in the mustard containers or leftover ketchup in the ketchup bottles. If you cannot get a container completely clean, it is best to put it into the trash so as not to contaminate the rest of your recycling material and the overall process.

DRY means letting containers dry before placing them in your blue container so that the paper and cardboard does not get wet. Wet or soiled paper and cardboard cannot be recycled.

By practicing Empty, Clean, Dry,™ with our families, we can ensure the recycling materials leaving our homes are in fact recyclable. Together, we are caretakers of this blue planet - our home, and largely covered with blue waters that flow beneath blue skies. 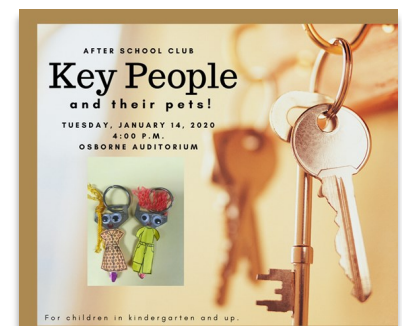
