



California Public Health Officials Provide COVID-19 Update

Today the CDPH released guidelines for counties to follow to reopen a broad range of businesses that have been closed since mid-March because of concerns about spreading the

coronavirus. The rules on schools and day camps will apply statewide. But only counties that have met certain thresholds on the number of cases, testing and preparedness will be allowed to start reopening the other sectors.

Businesses and activities eligible for reopening include:

- Schools and school-based programs
- Day camps
- Hotels, lodging and short-term rentals (for tourism and individual travel)
- Campgrounds, RV parks, and outdoor recreation
- Professional sports without live audiences
- Music, film and television production
- Gyms and fitness centers, including pools
- Zoos, museums, galleries and aquariums

Businesses in these sectors should carefully read the <u>guidance issued by the state website</u> and develop corresponding safety plans. Once those safety plans are completed, eligible businesses may reopen on or after June 12 without further approval.

Amendment to Fiscal Year 2019-20 Annual Action Plan. The Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act makes available \$5 billion in supplemental CDBG funding on March 27, 2020 to be used to prevent, prepare for and respond to Covid-19. The City of Fullerton will receive \$819,487 in CDBG-CV funds and must amend the Citizen Participation Plan and the FY 2019-20 Annual Action Plan as a condition of receipt of CARES funds.

<u>Fullerton Municipal Code Amendments Pertaining to Regulation of Short-Term Rentals</u> (<u>continued from June 2, 2020</u>). Reaffirmation of City's Commitment to Anti-Discrimination and Equitable Communities.

Adopt a Resolution of the City Council of the City of Fullerton reaffirming the City's commitment to a diverse, supportive, inclusive community and to protecting the Constitutional rights of its residents.

Aid Agreement for Exchange of Fire, Rescue and Emergency Medical Services Between the City of Placentia and the City of Fullerton (continued from June 2, 2020).

On July 1, 2020, the Placentia Fire and Life Safety Department will begin providing fire and emergency medical services to residents of Placentia. The City's contract with the Orange County Fire Authority for similar services terminates on June 30, 2020. Currently, the City of Fullerton has an Automatic Aid Agreement with the Orange County Fire Authority as the service provider for Placentia and the City of Placentia has requested the same agreement as of July 1, 2020. In addition, as part of outlining the procedures for carrying out responses between the two cities, a memorandum of understanding will be entered into by the Fire Chiefs. The City Council will decide whether to enter into an Automatic Aid agreement or Mutual Aid agreement.

<u>Establishment of Infrastructure Fund with Automatic Deposit of Revenues, Above A Baseline, for Designated Infrastructure Improvements.</u>

At the March 3, 2020 City Council meeting, Staff were provided direction during the report and recommendations from the Infrastructure and Natural Resources Advisory Committee (INRAC) item to bring back for consideration fiscal policies or ordinances related to finances that address current or future enhanced revenue sources and how such funds are expended, to ensure continued fiscal sustainability and ongoing infrastructure improvements. This item is a proposed ordinance which would create a dedicated Infrastructure Fund and set forth a method to deposit revenues above a designated baseline for property tax and sales tax revenues in order to increase the City's ability to make infrastructure improvements.

Pavement Management Plan Status and Update.

Orange County Transportation Authority requires all member agencies to update their Pavement Management Plan (PMP) on a bi-annual basis to remain eligible for transportation funding.

Professional Towing Services Request For Proposal.

Staff is requesting City Council to approve one or more tow operator applicants based on the recent RFP 4338 for professional towing services, for the City of Fullerton.

Chapman Avenue Infrastructure Improvements

Rehabilitation of 'Little' Chapman from Basque Avenue to Euclid Street was recently completed. The improvements included sewer main replacement, new sewer manholes, new water main and services on Orange Avenue, repair of damaged sidewalk and curb and gutter, new driveway and alley approaches and new curb ramps. Street pavement was rehabilitated by a 2" full width grind and overlay. Coordination with Stater Bros. was required to maintain truck deliveries while reconstructing their driveway approach.

Water Division Updates

Meter Shop

Meter Shop staff perform meter reading duties and respond to service calls during normal hours of operation and callouts after hours. In addition, they also turn water services on or off based on residents' needs, post water service accounts, replace water meters, water meter boxes/lids and perform repairs/tests on water meters.

Water Production

Staff perform a variety of field lab sampling as required by the state of California. This includes water samples from our wells, reservoirs and water distribution system. Control valves and plug valves regulate water between different pressure zones or elevations within the water system and require preventative maintenance (PM). Well production is a total of gallons produced from City water wells, and MWD production gallons reflect water purchased from Metropolitan Water District.

Water Distribution

This Division is responsible for the maintenance of the water transmission and distribution system that delivers water to City residents, businesses, and industries. The water transmission and distribution system consists of 430 miles of water pipeline, more than 31,500 metered services, 4,000 fire hydrants, and 12,000 valves. On an annual average, we respond to 4,600 underground service alert tickets.





Water Division Updates (continued)

On June 2nd, a Water Construction crew replaced a 6" broken water valve at 1422 Peckham Street. The valve replacement was critical to have water circulating in the distribution system and the capability to shut down the main in the event of an emergency. Street Division laid permanent asphalt the same day.

Commercial Organics Recycling Law

ATTENTION: FULLERTON BUSINESSES!

AB 1826 Mandatory Commercial Organics Recycling Law

Did you know that organic waste accounts for about 40% of the material Californians dispose in landfills annually? The Mandatory Organics Recycling Law (AB 1826) requires that **businesses and**

other generators of 4 or more cubic yards of solid waste per week arrange for recycling services for the following types of organic waste: food waste, green waste, landscape and pruning waste, nonhazardous wood waste, and food-soiled paper waste that is mixed with food waste. Multifamily complexes must arrange for recycling services for the same material with the exception of food waste and food-soiled paper.

Most organic waste is recyclable through methods such as composting, mulching, and anaerobic digestion. Organics must be separated from trash and you can comply with this law by choosing a combination of any of the following recycling program options.

- 1. Subscribe to the Food Scrap Recycling Program offered by Republic Services by calling 714-238-3317 or via email at ivllegas@republicservices.com.
- 2. Recycle food scraps onsite through methods such as composting, or self-haul food scraps to a composting facility (must keep documentation) and report method to Republic Services.
- 3. Donate eligible food to a local food bank or **Waste Not** OC by calling 855-700-9662 (must keep documentation).
- 4. **Applies to multi-family complexes only**: Advise your landscaper to properly divert collected organic waste from the landfill by hauling green waste to permitted facilities. Self-report by filling out multifamily complex option of the survey: http://bit.ly/FullertonAB1826.

Call or email the library between the hours of 11:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. at (714) 738-6333 or info@fullertonlibrary.org to request library materials. Adult library patrons may request up to 5 items; children may request up to 10 items. We will retrieve your books from the library shelves and follow up with you to arrange a pickup time at the library.

For your safety and the safety of library staff, please continue to follow personal protective guidelines, including social distancing, when using FPL's curbside pickup service, including these special instructions:

- When you arrive at your scheduled time, please pull into one of the marked Curbside Pickup Slots. Please call the Circulation desk and staff will come out with your items (the phone number will be displayed by the pickup area).
- Please remain within your vehicle. With your window rolled UP, be prepared to show your ID or library card. If you have a trunk, please open your trunk and staff will put your items within the trunk. If you do not have a trunk or access is not available, staff will roll your items up next to your car door for you to retrieve. Please do not open your door until staff has moved at least 6 feet away.
- If you need to return items, please wait until staff has returned to the library and then you may approach the return slot.
- Pickup times must be scheduled between 1:00 p.m. and 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Available time slots will be filled on a first come, first served basis.
- Please remember that the Fullerton Public Library remains closed to the public. Lobbies, restrooms, computers, and other spaces will not be accessible



DID YOU KNOW...

Early Fullerton History

Constructed in 1914, the Elephant Packing House at 201 W Truslow is one of the last remaining packing-houses in Fullerton, where at one time as many as ten such plants lined the railroad tracks. It was originally leased to Elephant Orchards of Redlands but in

1932 the Chapman family subleased the facility and for 20 years the Chapman's Old Mission Brand Valencia oranges were packed here.
