## City Manager's Message

### Annual 4th of July Fireworks Festival Cancelled

The City of Fullerton's Annual 4th of July Fireworks Festival event is unfortunately being cancelled for 2020. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the State of California has public health directives in place that prohibit community mass gatherings. Further, the recent trend of persons testing positive in Orange County is being attributed to increased gatherings and loosening of restrictions. It is in the best interest of our community's health to not hold the event this year in order to prevent further spread of the disease. The majority of Orange County cities are similarly cancelling their Fourth of July celebrations.

Fullerton residents are encouraged to enjoy Independence Day safely by celebrating with legal, safe, and sane fireworks. For those who want the sparkle of a fireworks Fourth; local non-profit fireworks booths open on July 1st. **We ask our community to celebrate safely.** Using illegal fireworks is extremely dangerous and prohibited. In addition to being illegal, the aerial fireworks are upsetting to local pets, children, seniors, and Veterans. 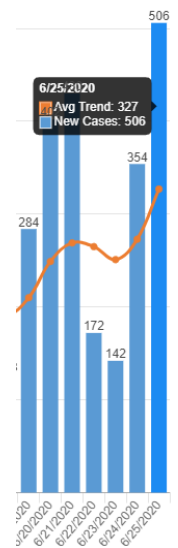
### County Hits New High In Positive COVID-19 Cases

The County hit a new high of 506 positive cases of COVID-19 on June 25th, an unfortunate trend which has added 2,006 new cases in the last week. ### Small Business Emergency Grant Assistance Program

The City of Fullerton City Council approved a Small Business Emergency Grant Assistance Program. The program consists of forgivable loans of up to \$25,000, funded by additional CDBG funds from the CARES Act. The funds are intended to help vulnerable small businesses impacted by COVID-19. ## Basque Avenue Storm Drain Improvements

The City is in the final stages of storm drain and street improvements on Basque Avenue between Commonwealth Avenue and Amerige Avenue. The improvements include extending a 60" diameter storm drain pipe from Commonwealth to Amerige, installing new catch basin, repairing damaged sidewalk and curb and gutter, replacing damaged driveway approaches and new curb ramps. Street pavement was also reconstructed. The project required extensive coordination with AT&T to relocate their underground fiber optic facilities.

Meter Shop staff perform meter reading duties and respond to service calls during normal hours of operation and callouts after hours. In addition, they also turn water services on or off based on residents' needs, post water service accounts, replace water meters, water meter boxes/lids and perform repairs/tests on water meters.

### Water Production

Staff perform a variety of field lab sampling as required by the State of California. This includes water samples from our wells, reservoirs and water distribution system. Control valves and plug valves regulate water between different pressure zones or elevations within the water system and require preventative maintenance (PM). Well production is a total of gallons produced from City water wells, and MWD production gallons reflect water purchased from Metropolitan Water District.

### Water Distribution

This Division is responsible for the maintenance of the water transmission and distribution system that delivers water to City residents, businesses, and industries. The water transmission and distribution system consists of 430 miles of water pipeline, more than 31,500 metered services, 4,000 fire hydrants, and 12,000 valves. On an annual average, we respond to 4,600 Underground Service Alert tickets.

# Public Works

## Water Main Break

Monday, June 15, members of the Water Construction section responded to a water main break at 3419 Twilight Drive. The crew replaced approximately 6.5 feet of 6-inch diameter water main. An existing water service was reconnected to the new section of water main, and the area was left secured. On Wednesday, June 17, the Sewer Division assisted with the cleanup of the mud, and the excavation was prepared for the installation of hot asphalt. Our Street Division installed the asphalt on Thursday, June 18.



## How to Dispose of Sharps Safely & Legally

### What to Do with Used Sharps in California

Put used sharps in a strong, plastic container.

When the container is 3/4 full, put the lid on, seal it with duct tape, and label **DO NOT RECYCLE**.



In California, it is illegal to place containers of used sharps (needles, syringes, lancets, auto injectors, infusion sets, connection needles) in household trash. Please place them in a strong plastic container, like an empty laundry detergent or bleach bottle, seal it with duct tape, label "DO NOT RECYCLE" and bring it to any Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Collection Center.

## Senior Services

The Parks and Recreation Department is **STILL CONNECTING & SERVING**  
our senior community.

Senior services during COVID-19 include: Meals on Wheels OC food distribution and home delivery, grocery box distribution, Senior Buddies Program in partnership with Fullerton Free, emergency feeding assistance, and regular wellness reassurance calls to our community members. Through our partnerships, we have been able to provide 7,157 seniors with food and other essential services.

The Fullerton Community Center is meeting the needs of the community by distributing free groceries to over 350 seniors and families in need each week through our partnership with Second Harvest Food Bank. Groceries are distributed every Thursday from 1pm to 3pm and we are currently operating as a drive-up service to allow for social distance and safety guidelines. **Please note: starting July 2<sup>nd</sup>, we will be distributing produce boxes only. Second Harvest will be discontinuing the shelf-stable boxes.**



Through our **Generations United** program, we have been able to hand deliver cards, letters and artwork items from local children and families to homebound seniors over the last two weeks. The mission of the program is to bring families and seniors together through caring connections. These small acts of kindness and service can bring sunshine into the lives of older adults who are isolated during this difficult time. To participate in the program, please send greeting cards, letters, or artwork to the Fullerton Community Center at 340 W. Commonwealth, Fullerton 92832 and City staff will deliver to Fullerton's homebound seniors.

Our first activity packet for seniors was such a big hit, we decided to create another one! The packet consists of local resources for food and other essentials, at-home exercises for balance and mobility, and an assortment of entertaining puzzles and games. The activity packets provide a nice break from the seniors' routines and help keep them entertained while at home. FCC staff and our senior patrons appreciate these extra ways of having fun and staying connected when we can't be together in person. The activity packets are passed out during weekly Meals on Wheels distribution and delivery. Call or email the library between the hours of 11:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. at (714) 738-6333 or [info@fullertonlibrary.org](mailto:info@fullertonlibrary.org) to request library materials. Adult library patrons may request up to 5 items; children may request up to 10 items. We will retrieve your books from the library shelves and follow up with you to arrange a pickup time at the library.

For your safety and the safety of library staff, please continue to follow personal protective guidelines, including social distancing, when using FPL's curbside pickup service, including these special instructions:

- When you arrive at your scheduled time, please pull into one of the marked Curbside Pickup Slots. Please call the Circulation desk and staff will come out with your items (the phone number will be displayed by the pickup area).
- Please remain within your vehicle. With your window rolled UP, be prepared to show your ID or library card. If you have a trunk, please open your trunk and staff will put your items within the trunk. If you do not have a trunk or access is not available, staff will roll your items up next to your car door for you to retrieve. Please do not open your door until staff has moved at least 6 feet away.
- If you need to return items, please wait until staff has returned to the library and then you may approach the return slot.
- Pickup times must be scheduled between 1:00 p.m. and 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Available time slots will be filled on a first come, first served basis.
- Please remember that the Fullerton Public Library remains closed to the public. Lobbies, restrooms, computers, and other spaces will not be accessible.

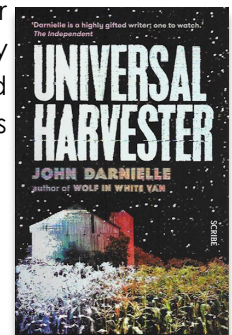
## Boardgame Empire Takes Over The Internet!

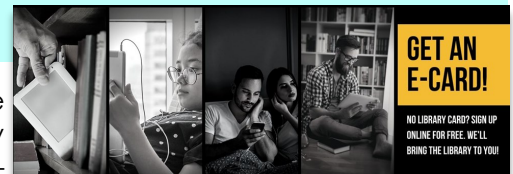
