SHARED COMMAND STAFF

Established in 2011, the cities of Brea and Fullerton combined the command staffs of the individual agencies to capture cost savings and efficiencies while still meeting the expectations of both communities for emergency services. The Shared Command Staff includes the Fire Chief, Deputy Chief-Operations, Deputy Chief- Administration/Fire Marshal, Division Chief of Training and Division Chief of Logistics, three shift Battalion Chiefs, EMS Manager, Utility Workers, and Fire Chaplain. Command Staff oversees 10 stations, 34.65 square miles, and over 100 personnel responding to 18,724 emergency incidents.












CAL- JAC* **MEMBERS TRANSITIONED** APPRENTICE TO **JOURNEY LEVEL**






