CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

## WEST COYOTE HILLS

TRAIL OPENING APRIL 2023

For nearly a century, the West Coyote Hills (WCH) property in the City of Fullerton, California, operated as an oil field consisting of over 2,000 acres. Operations ceased in the early 1990s, and subsequently all wells were abandoned.

The WCH property is one of the few large, contiguous tracts of natural lands south of the San Gabriel Mountains. It is home to protected vegetation, such as coastal sage scrub, and a variety of wildlife species, including the endangered coastal California gnatcatcher. The gnatcatcher is associated almost exclusively with coastal sage scrub habitat.

The ribbon-cutting ceremony to officially take over and open the initial trails in the Robert Ward Nature Preserve and celebrate the acquisition of neighborhoods 1 and 3 will be held on Saturday, April 1, 2023.

This will allow enough time for Chevron/PCH to complete the trail repairs after the rains. The recent rains were very helpful in identifying erosion problems and mitigation. US Fish & Wildlife Services requested another gnat catcher bird count, from Chevron/PCH, before issuing their approval to open the Ward Preserve.

## SHELTER SPOTLIGHT

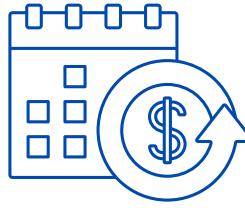

## POPULAR ANNUAL FINANCIAL REPORT FOR FY 2021-22

## FY 2023-24 BUDGET UPDATE

FY 2023-24 Budget Development continues as departments are developing their budget requests in alignment with the City's budget guidelines for FY 2023-24. The Budget Process is administered by the Administrative Services staff under the leadership of the City Manager's Office, ensuring the City Council input and priorities are incorporated in each year's process. The initial FY 2023-24 Proposed Budget will be presented to the City Council tentatively scheduled for April 25, 2023 and will include a General Fund Financial Forecast.



## COPIER MASTER LEASE PROJECT

In November 2022, City Council approved a new Master Services agreement with Konica Minolta to consolidate all copier devices on one master lease to achieve cost savings, uniform terms, and newer technology and equipment. Since then, Staff has been working proactively with the vendor and all departments to assess copier and technology needs. New copier equipment will be ordered in phases for all City facilities, with first deployment for City Hall anticipated in late March 2023 / early April 2023.

## LOW-INCOME HOUSEHOLD WATER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The Utility Services Division continues to inform delinquent customers that the Low Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP) is still open and accepting applications. This program, which is administered by the State, is available until August 2023 or until funds have been exhausted. The LIHWAP is also available on a first-come, first serve basis.

The State has contracted with Community Action Partnership of Orange County (CAPOC) to act as its local service provider in the region, which includes Fullerton. As CAPOC receives and approves Fullerton resident LIHWAP applications, CAPOC and City staff work together to review LIHWAP approved customer accounts to maximize the subsidy for eligible Fullerton residents.



## UTILITY SERVICES DIVISION CALL VOLUME

As customers have begun to respond to "Disconnection For Non-Payment" (i.e., posting) notices, the Utility Services Division call volume has increased significantly. With customer requests for payment arrangements, staff shortages, staff engaged in utility billing system implementation, and training of new staff, the call wait times have increased. The City has hired new staff to fill vacant positions, which will allow the division (over time with training) to more expeditiously respond to customers.

## BUILDING UPDATES

Our plan check engineering team has completed review for new solar panel upgrades to both City Hall and the Police Department, construction is moving forward.

The review team has completed review of Tenant Improvements for Building 2 and 3 of the Goodman Logistics project.

The total valuation of projects in review, complete, or issued is now over \$90 Million, a strong indicator of Fullerton's ongoing valuable strategic location for developments.

## PLANNING UPDATES

The Initial Study will be released for 30-day public review for a proposed warehouse which will replace the former Hotel Fullerton at 1500 Raymond Avenue. The project will be scheduled for public hearing with the Planning Commission in late spring.

Staff prepared and submitted the Model Water Efficient Landscape Ordinance Implementation Annual Report for 2022 to the California Department of Water Resources. This report is a mandatory annual requirement and showed that the City of Fullerton reviewed and issued permits for 340,814 square feet of new or upgraded landscaping that comply with the state's water-preservation ordinance.

# FIRE DEPARTMENT

## Fire Recruitment Update

On Thursday February 9th, 160 Firefighter Trainee candidates gathered during two sessions at the Fullerton Community Center gymnasium to take the written exam for the Fullerton Fire Department. Prior to each session, Fire Chief Adam Loeser greeted the candidates and they had an opportunity to meet the fire crews of Fullerton Engine 5 and Fullerton Truck 6. We're excited for our future and to hire the next generation of Fullerton Firefighters!

## Chief Officer Workshop

This week, the Fullerton Fire Department held a two day Chief Officer Workshop geared towards preparing (6) Fire Captains for the upcoming Fire Battalion Chief's Promotional Exam. The Workshop covered topics including Chief Officer roles and responsibilities, command and control of emergency incidents ranging from basic to complex (think high-rise fire, hazardous materials spill, mayday for a Firefighter trapped, train derailment, active shooter, vegetation fire involving multiple homes, airport incident), fire service leadership, risk assessment and scene management, personnel management and development.

## Stop the Bleed Event

In partnership with UCI Health and City of Fullerton Public Works. Fullerton Fire Department hosted "Stop the Bleed" for frontline Public Works Staff. The ability to stop bleeding in an accident, emergency, or disaster can save lives. Learning this lifesaving skill empowers Fullerton staff at work and in their home community.



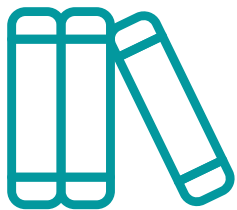


# HUMAN RESOURCES

## RECRUITMENT SUMMARY

- A recruitment for **Assistant Engineer - Water** was posted on January 26. We are accepting applications on a continuous basis until enough qualified applications are received.
- A recruitment for **Environmental Services Coordinator** was posted on January 27. We are accepting applications on a continuous basis until enough qualified applications are received.
- A recruitment for **Solid Waste and Recycling Specialist** was posted on January 27. We are accepting applications on a continuous basis until enough qualified applications are received.
- A recruitment for **Police Records Specialist** was reposted on January 30 and is scheduled to close on February 19.
- A recruitment for **Firefighter Trainee** opened on January 3 and closed on January 22. 469 applications were received of which approximately 220 were invited to the written test. Of those invited, 196 signed up for the written test administered on February 9. Candidates who pass the written test will be invited to an oral board. These interviews are tentatively scheduled for the week of February 27. Candidates who pass the oral board will be placed on an eligible list and may move forward to a Fire Chief's interview. Based on current vacancies as well as anticipated promotions within the Fire Department, the City anticipates hiring 10-15 Firefighter candidates from this recruitment.
- A recruitment for **Maintenance Worker/Senior Maintenance Worker I** opened on January 11 as a continuous recruitment. Testing will be scheduled bi-monthly until all vacancies for these positions are filled with the next written test scheduled for March 10. To date, 92 applications have been submitted
- A recruitment for **Police Services Representative** opened on January 4 and closed on January 29. 87 applications have been received and are currently being screened by subject matter experts.
- A recruitment for **Human Resources/Risk Management Analyst II** for the Human Resources Department opened on December 1 and closed on January 1. 35 applications were received of which 6 have been invited to participate in the oral board scheduled for February 24.
- A recruitment for **Adult Services Librarian** opened on December 16 and closed on January 8. 49 applications were received. Interviews were conducted on January 24 and the eligible list was established on January 25. The Library is currently conducting selection interviews.
- A recruitment for **Police Officer Trainee** was posted on September 19, 2022, and closed on December 11, 2022. 150 applications were received of which 116 did not meet the testing requirements. The remaining 34 candidates were invited to a Physical Ability Test (PAT) administered on January 27. 14 responded to the invitation of which only 9 reported. The 5 who passed the PAT were invited to an oral interview - 1 withdrew, 3 failed and 1 was placed in the eligible list.
- A recruitment for **Parks and Recreation Supervisor I/II** for the Parks and Recreation Department opened on November 16 and closed on December 11. 64 applications were received. Assessment interviews were conducted and an eligible list was established on February 8.
- A recruitment for **Senior Administrative Analyst** opened on October 17 and closed on November 20. 34 applications were received. A written test was administered on December 8. Assessment interviews were held on January 11 and the eligible list was established on January 12. Appointments are pending.
- The City accepts applications on a continuous basis for **Police Officer Trainee**. The next round of testing is scheduled to begin January 27.
- A recruitment for **Police Records Shift Leader** for the Police Department opened on December 6 and close on December 18. The eligible list was established on December 19 and appointment is pending.
- A promotional recruitment for **Plan Check Engineer** was opened on December 22 and closed on January 8. The eligible list was established on January 9 and a promotion is pending.

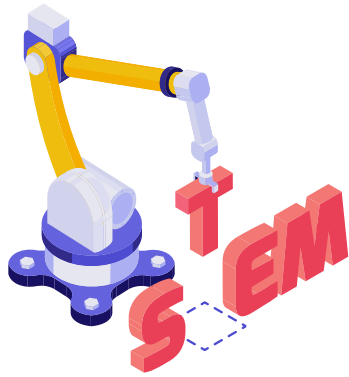
## ON GOING PROJECTS CONTINUED

## HAPPENING AT THE FCC

### Union Pacific Park

Parks & Recreation and Public Works met with the Union Pacific Adhoc committee to discuss the potential amenities and design of the Union Pacific Park. The committee is interested in activating the park with amenities that would bring positive activities, throughout the day, into the park such as pickleball, basketball, a small playground, and multi-use open space. The next step is to bring in the landscape architect to draft some concept designs to present to the committee.



### Pooch Park

The engineering and bids for the relocation of the Pooch Park from the Hunt Branch Park to the Brea Dam park has been completed. After the construction contract is awarded at City Council in March, the construction is expected in April or May depending on material availability. Construction will take approximately three months.

### Parks & Trails

Residents must bring their own solid containers or buckets (no bags), which Republic Services staff will fill with compost. There is a limit of 60 gallons per household. Residents must provide proof of Fullerton residency (California driver's license or utility bill). Compost creates healthier soil by adding organic matter and improving soil structure. Healthy soil uses water more efficiently, allowing available water to flow toward your plants' roots, storing water in the soil longer, and reducing runoff and erosion.

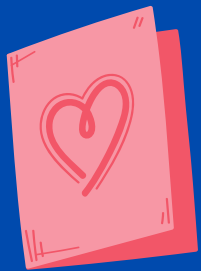

This dangerous drug is nearly 50 times stronger than heroin and 100 times stronger than morphine. Over 150 people die every day from overdoses related to drugs like Fentanyl. Unfortunately, some of these cases from our very own community.



## INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Work has been progressing at the **Fullerton Community Center**. The site is receiving new networking equipment, new Audio/Video components in various rooms, and a new paging system. The Classroom and Boardroom A/V upgrades are complete, and staff is being trained. The new A/V system in the Grand Hall is now being programmed. Cabling for the new paging system is in progress. The project is scheduled for completion later this month.

Many staff are enjoying upgraded desktop PCs. Upgrades for the **Engineering Department** were recently completed. Over 146 new PCs have been deployed so far, 53% of the total currently in scope, with overall completion scheduled by the end of May 2023.

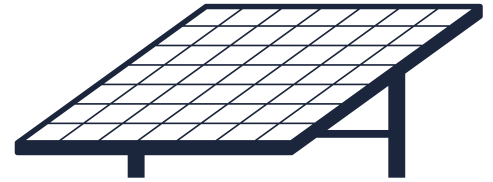
# PUBLIC WORKS

## CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

### **NORESCO ENERGY UPGRADE PROJECT UPDATE:**

Improvements are continuing at a steady pace. Lighting upgrade work is approximately 80% complete and work is currently in progress at City Hall. Improvements in the Council Chamber will start immediately after the Council meeting on February 7th.

The solar panels and electric vehicle charging station improvements at the Police Department are on schedule with completion expected in a couple of weeks. Improvements at City Hall will start on Monday and are expected to take six weeks.



### **SAFE STREETS & ROADS FOR ALL GRANT**

The City of Fullerton was selected to be awarded a Safe Streets and Roads for All Planning Grant for development of an Action Plan. The award is for \$200,000 in Federal funding, with a total project cost of \$250,000.

The safety of our residents and roadway patrons is paramount! The City of Fullerton is committed to identifying and implementing potential strategies/improvements to reduce fatalities and severe injuries on our roadway network. The development of an Action Plan will give us the foundation to implement low-cost, high-impact strategies to improve safety over a wide geographic area, including within our disadvantaged communities.

With nearly 60% of the City's population in Disadvantaged Census Tracts, the Action Plan will assist City staff in identifying safety needs in these communities. The needs in these areas are typically greater and will be highlighted in the Action Plan. Safety is universal and does not discriminate.

Fullerton's Action Plan will utilize citywide collision data and claims history to identify the safety needs throughout the City. Once the needs are determined, we will perform thorough community and stakeholder engagement to provide input on the data-driven needs and recommendations. The goal will be to develop a Plan that mitigates fatalities through proven and innovative means while being in-line with public expectations. We also plan to develop a proactive approach that will provide Safer Streets & Roads for All!
