PARK CAPITAL PROJECTS (CIP)

• **Acacia Park playground**

- Playground was closed in May due to a variety of issues: exposed concrete footings, surface in bad condition, missing playground equipment and the playground itself no longer being up to code. The Parks and Recreation Department met with many playground professionals and unfortunately, reopening the current playground was not possible.
- Playground order has been placed and is scheduled to be installed in September of 2023
- Demolition of current playground is complete

• **Emery Park**

- Scope of project includes a new playground with an adjacent picnic area and an ADA accessible walkway from Sunny Ridge Drive
- Project is currently in design phase

• **Juanita Cooke Trail**

- Scope of project includes widening Juanita Cooke trail on Morelia Avenue between Bastanchury Road and Laguna Road
- Project was approved by council May 4, 2023
- Expected completion date: Summer 2023

• **Union Pacific Park**

- Project would be construction of a new park and demolition of current amenities
- Staff is currently looking for funding sources

PLANNING UPDATES



Planning is excited to announce that there are 2 new exciting food options nearing completion as follows:

Raising Cane's restaurant at 201 West Orangethorpe Avenue is nearing completion and is projected to open in early August. The restaurant site features low-water use landscaping, twin drive-through lanes with overhead covers, and contemporary architectural style of the building. Within the interior of the restaurant, displays featuring notable Fullerton alumni are shown (astronauts, actors, athletes, etc...). The interior decorations are fun and whimsical and include three rotating disco balls.

Lagos Mexican Restaurant at 139 West Santa Fe Avenue is also nearing completion and is projected to open in mid-August. The restaurant site features lush landscaping, extensive Mexican art pieces, and high-quality building finishes and accoutrements. The restaurant includes a main dining room, bar area, banquet room, and outside patio dining area. Throughout the site, the owner has invested in custom art pieces to include life size Catrinas figures (Day of the Dead statues), Maya Ballgame hoops, and elaborate custom metal chandeliers.

We welcome them to the City of Fullerton!

Planning staff has been reviewing the preliminary plans for a proposed affordable housing project (**Pathways of Hope**) for the properties at 508-514 W. Amerige Avenue. The site is developed with three old homes, one that was built in 1912, and the others which are estimated to have been built in the late 1800's. Because the houses are not considered historical, the developer has the ability to demolish these structures. However, Fullerton Heritage has been working to save these homes and with the permission of the property owner, is searching for parcels to relocate them to prior to demolition work commencing.

The Community Development Department has been implementing a new version of **Energov** (building, planning, and engineering permitting software), which has had some challenges. However, many issues that are discovered are resolved within short order and don't affect public service. Planning is looking at ways to further make use of this software and increase customer service by implementing new processes that can be done on-line thereby not requiring applicants to come in to City Hall. Some proposed processes will include special event permits, outdoor dining permits, minor site plan reviews, and ADU reviews.

BUILDING & SAFETY CONTINUED

The building and safety division has continued its efforts to improve cross-training of staff. The technician team joined senior building inspector Noah Lysek on a grading inspection at a major project in town. These efforts help build teamwork and ensure our team better understands the result of their work on the permitting side of our business process.

The division would like to welcome Giovanni Lewis, our new Building Inspector I. We are excited to have Lewis join the team as we continue to provide first-class inspection service.

In addition, to assist the Code Enforcement Division, our inspectors have been out to five separate buildings in the last two weeks to assist the Fire Department. One of the field responses related to the active fire resulted in a red-tagged building.

CODE ENFORCEMENT



Our Code Enforcement and Housing Divisions have a new home!

The teams officially moved from the third floor to the basement offices on June 30, 2023. Please refer customers and residents to the new basement floor offices for any Code Enforcement or Housing services.

On July 13, 2023, with the assistance of the Building Division, Southern CA Edison, and PD, Code Enforcement Staff executed an expedited court-ordered abatement warrant to close and Red-Tag the illegal cannabis businesses operating at 2007.

Raymer Avenue Unit M. The OC Superior Court judge granted the City's petition for the abatement warrant since the City obtained evidence that this was the same business owner for other previously closed dispensaries in the City of Fullerton.

Earlier that same day, the California Department of Cannabis Control agency also executed a warrant. The agency informed City Staff that \$5,126 cash, 58 pounds of cannabis product as well as 2.45 pounds of other illicit drugs was seized.

As part of the execution of the warrant, the Building Inspector affixed a Red Tag declaring it an unsafe building and illegal to occupy. The building will remain unoccupied and Red Tagged until the property owner obtains permits to restore the building. Code Enforcement staff will follow up to ensure any costs incurred by the City for such abatements will be recovered pursuant to the Fullerton Municipal Code.

CITY COUNCIL RECOGNITION

Fullerton Fire Fighters will be recognized at the July 18, 2023, Council Meeting for their life saving measures of one of Fullerton's Youngest Babies.

On **May 15, 2023**, Fullerton Fire Department and Fullerton Police Department responded "Code 3" to a 2-month-old in distress who was lethargic. Fullerton Police Officers were first on the scene. The officers realized the baby was in distress and had quickly become unresponsive. The officers immediately started CPR and attached the 2-month-old to their AED, administering an appropriate amount of shock to the infant. Firefighter/Paramedics arrived quickly and continued life-saving measures. As soon as safe, the Firefighter/Paramedics transported the infant to our local children's trauma center. En route to the hospital, the Firefighter/Paramedics continued life-saving measures and based on the analysis by AED, shocked the infant three more times. When they arrived at the hospital, doctors were able to save the infant, but only because of the stabilization provided through first responders being able to utilize an AED.

The Fullerton Police Department carries AEDs in their patrol vehicles. In this instance, an infant's life was saved by an AED, the quick action of FPD, and the skilled Firefighter/Paramedics who continued life-saving measures and AED treatment on the way to the hospital.

The infant remained in the hospital for further tests where they discovered an underlying condition unknown to the parents. Without the quick response and action of Police Officers, Firefighter/Paramedics, and an AED, the outcome and impact on this 2-month-old and its family could have ended differently, with lasting results or tragedy for the family and survivors. A special thanks to the professional police officers and firefighter paramedics who supported this young child and its family.

RECENT EVENTS

On Monday, July 17th, 2023, the Fullerton Fire Department welcomed **12** new **Firefighter Trainees** to start their **6-week Academy** that is being administered on the drill grounds of Fullerton Fire Station 1. This will be the FFD's largest Academy and is a heavy logistical lift to include all the turnout gear, two vans for transport, and even portable bathrooms. The candidates successfully passed the:

- application review
- the written exam
- the Fire Captains Interview
- the Fire Chief's Interview
- thorough background
- polygraph
- medical exam
- and psychological evaluation

After the 6-week Academy, they will then have a **12-month probation** to be evaluated against the standards of the Department.

One may ask, why are there so many hurdles to becoming a Firefighter- the simple answer is "public trust". The Fullerton Firefighter badge is a symbol of this trust, and it is through these processes that trust is earned.

Congratulations to everyone, and a special thanks to the members of the FFD Fire Cadre who will instruct and guide them through this initial journey. Fullerton Mayor, Fred Jung and Fullerton City Manager, Eric Levitt were in attendance welcoming the group to the City of Fullerton.

RECRUITMENT SUMMARY

- A recruitment for **Director of Public Works** was posted on April 3 and closed on June 14. 48 applications were received, with 5 candidates being invited to continue in the process. Interviews are tentatively scheduled for August 11.
- A recruitment for **Firefighter/Paramedic - Lateral** was posted on May 31 and closed on June 18. 14 applications were received. 8 candidates are scheduled to test starting on July 26. The eligible list should be established by August 1.
- A recruitment for **Housing Manager** was posted on July 14 and is scheduled to close on August 6. To date, 15 applications have been received.
- A recruitment for **Human Resources Technician** was posted on May 1 and closed on June 4. 246 applications were received of which 104 were invited and 79 self-scheduled for the written test administered on June 29. The eligible list was established on July 12 with 38 candidates.
- A recruitment for **Payroll Technician** was posted on July 12 and is scheduled to close on August 13. To date, 74 applications have been received.
- The recruitment for **Police Dispatcher** is open and continuous. Testing has been conducted as follows:
 - A test was administered on May 18 and the eligible list was established on was posted on May 30
 - A test was administered on June 9 and the eligible list was established on June 21.
 - A test was administered on July 13 and an eligible list is pending.
 - A test is scheduled for August 10.
- The recruitment for **Police Officer Trainee** is open and continuous. The eligible list has been established as follows:

 - May 19, 2023
 - June 21, 2023

A written test was administered on June 27 with additional testing scheduled for August 9 and August 15.

- The promotional recruitment for **Police Sergeant** was posted on June 26 and closed on July 16. The written testing process will be administered in the weeks of July 31 and August 7.
- A recruitment for **Source Control Inspector** was posted on May 15 and closed on June 4. 21 applications were received of which 8 were invited to interviews held on July 10. The eligible list was established on July 12.



ARREST OF INTEREST

On July 8th, during On Patrol: Live, Cpl. Ramek and Ofc. Vega stopped two males who they believed to have just been involved in a drug transaction. Although one male insisted nothing was going on, upon further investigation, Officers located various narcotics packaged for sale. In all, approximately 119 grams of methamphetamine and 75 grams of fentanyl were found. Both males were taken into custody and booked on multiple narcotic and weapons charges.

Fentanyl is a highly addictive synthetic opioid. Often consumed unknowingly by users, illicit fentanyl is driving the recent increase in U.S. overdose and poisoning deaths.

- Inventory - photograph valuables & make a list of the make, model, serial numbers & value
- Make sure cameras are working and are not obstructed
- Test your alarm and make sure your provider has updated emergency contacts
- Secure any furniture or items outside that can be used by burglars to climb into second story


PD NEWS

The Fullerton Police Department, in partnership with Flying Lion and Fullerton College, will be conducting the Drone as a First Responder (DFR) concept for a 30-day trial period. This trial period will allow the department to determine if a DFR program is effective for our community moving forward. It will start on July 26th.

DFR, as employed by FPD, will consist of drones positioned at a high point in the city, providing the ability to immediately deploy them to reported emergency incidents, calls for service, or first responder requests. In many cases, the drones can arrive at any given incident prior to first responders on the ground.

The DFR Program follows all established FAA guidelines, privacy laws, and Fullerton PD Policies regarding the use of Unmanned Aerial Systems (UAS/Drones).

Since our initial DFR Program is being conducted in conjunction with Fullerton College and Flying Lion, our UAS program has adopted the call sign "Hornet", in homage to the Fullerton College "Hornets". For more information visit our website at www.FullertonPD.org.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

We are pleased to report that the project to replace **275 desktop personal computers** and **15 mobile data terminals** (MDTs) was completed in June. These new devices enable staff to enjoy better performance, enhanced productivity, improved ability to collaborate.

In June's email phishing simulation, we saw a tie with our **lowest failure rate - 2%**! Out of 650 emails sent, 14 took the bait. Keep up the good work identifying suspicious emails! To help us refine our skills, monthly cybersecurity training in KnowBe4 is assigned so that we know what pitfalls to look for. We encourage all to complete the assigned training each month so we can all keep our skills sharp. When you see a suspicious email, report it using the **PhishAlert** button in Outlook. This alerts our security team to analyze the message and verify the sender. If the message is determined to be malicious, the team can block the sender and/or remove harmful emails from our environment. It all starts with you!




City Of Fullerton Meter Health Analytics Pilot Project

The scope of work for this project is for a pilot study for Olea Edge Analytics 'Meter Health Analytics' devices to be installed on 50 of the City's largest water meters.

These AI-based edge technology devices or sensors will perform diagnostics to monitor health and performance with the following objectives:

- Identify underperforming large commercial/ industrial meters to assist in reducing apparent losses
- Determine specific cause of meter failure or defect
- Make recommendation(s) to repair deficient meters

The project is 100% grant funded from the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California's Innovative Conservation Program. Installation will begin on July 24, 2023, with the first set of data points to be provided to the City by August 31, 2023.
