TROPICAL STORM HILARY

During the recent tropical storm there were several trees that caused property damage and debris in the streets and storm drains, but overall, the impacts from Tropical Storm Hilary were minimal in Fullerton.

Prior to the storm City staff closely monitored weather conditions, prepared for potential impacts, and provided continuous updates and safety preparedness measures both internally and externally. Over 11,000 sandbags were issued and over 45 tons of sand provided to Fullerton residents from the City Yard.

HUNT LIBRARY UPDATE

Staff from Public Works, Library, Parks and Recreation, Community Development and the City Manager's Office have been working hard on the revitalization efforts of the Hunt Library. We are excited to share all the progress that has been made on this project.

The ribbon cutting ceremony and community open house has been tentatively scheduled for October 21st at 10am.

Construction Updates:

Staff has initiated design of the site improvements which will be minimized to address accessibility, fire access and functionality of the site. Improvements will include new accessible parking stalls; accessible path of travel to the building, new trash enclosure (none currently exist); entrance drive aisle modifications for fire access and improved site circulation. Also included is modification of the existing location of the Pooch Park. The small dog and large dog areas will retain their same footprint but will be relocated to the southeast corner of the site, to provide a larger buffer from the parking area and building. The number of parking stalls will remain the same, however, the site improvements will be designed to allow expansion of parking if warranted in the future.

Programming Updates:

Library and Parks and Recreation staff has been working closely with staff at the Fullerton School District to identify partnership and programming opportunities for the Hunt Library facility. Ideas include after school programming, reading nights, art rotations, parenting/adult classes, and family programs. We are finalizing negotiations with the district and hope to have a formal partnership agreement in place soon.

Staff has also been working with vendors to purchase furniture, equipment and other supplies needed for the various spaces inside the facility including the dedicated library use, art exhibit spaces, and multi-purpose spaces.

Private Rental Updates:

On August 15, 2023, the City Council adopted a resolution establishing the rental fees for the Hunt Library. The adopted rates offer a more affordable option than the Fullerton Community Center but slightly higher rates than the Maple Community Center due to the larger footprint and higher capacity available at the Hunt Library. Staff based the proposed hourly rates for staffing and security on the established rates for other similar city facilities including the Fullerton Community Center.

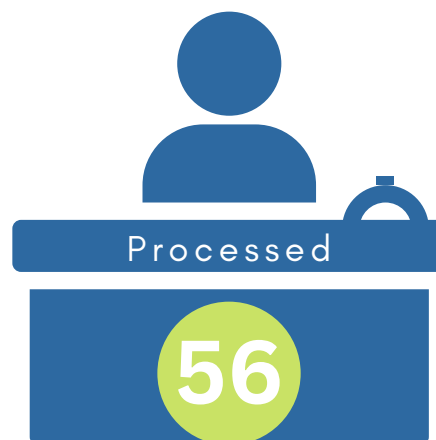


CITYWIDE GRANTS MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

TYLER MUNIS IMPLEMENTATION

Tyler Munis Go-live Success – General Billing

ASD is in the process of performing the first month of billings in the new Tyler Munis system. The billings include fire permits and inspections, Airport hangars and tiedowns, grant awards, and lease agreements. As of August 21, 2023, all scheduled billings are being processed per the general billing cycle.

Reminder for City staff to utilize the new General Billing Request form available on the City's intranet.

Tyler Munis Go-live Success – Accounts Receivable Related Cashiering

The Utility Services Division is successfully processing general billing receipts in Tyler Munis cashiering.

The implementation of Tyler Cashiering, Tyler Payments and Global Payments Integrated City-wide will be forthcoming in a phased approach by department through the October / November timeframe. Updates and detailed schedules to follow.

Tyler Munis Implementation Update – Utility Billing and Utility Billing Related Cashiering, Citizen Self Service, Credit Card and eCheck Payment Processing

The Administrative Services Department and the Public Works Water Operations Division – Meter Shop are actively implementing the Tyler Munis utility billing software application currently scheduled to go-live in November 2023. Tyler Cashiering related to Utility Billing will be implemented along with Utility Billing.

Implementation of the Citizen Self-Service portal has been delayed and will be phased in along with the transition of credit card and eCheck payment processing through Tyler Pay and Global Payments Integrated. Updates and schedules to follow.

LOW INCOME HOUSEHOLD WATER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The Utility Services Division continues to inform delinquent customers that the **Low Income Household Water Assistance Program** (LIHWAP) is still open and accepting applications. This program, which is administered by the State of California, is available on a first come, first served basis until August 31, 2023 or until funds have been exhausted.

The State has contracted with Community Action Partnership of Orange County (CAPOC) to act as its local service provider in the region, which includes Fullerton. As CAPOC receives and approves Fullerton resident LIHWAP applications, CAPOC and City staff work together to review LIHWAP approved customer accounts to maximize the subsidy for eligible Fullerton residents. CAPOC is accepting new applications up to August 31, 2023.

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES



UTILITY SERVICES DIVISION CUSTOMER DEPOSITS

On August 15, 2023, the Utility Services Division began requiring deposits for all accounts that are shut-off for non-payment as a condition to have the service re-established. This is in accordance with Rule 6 (item B) of the Water Rates, Rules and Regulations.

Disconnection of water service due to non-payment was on hold from the start of the COVID pandemic. The City Council approved restarting the collection process effective in October 2022. The collection process includes posting notices and disconnecting water service due to non-payment of the utility bill. To provide customers the best opportunity to bring their accounts current, the requirement of a deposit for reestablishment of water service, in accordance with Rule 6, was not enforced until now.

UTILITY SERVICES DIVISION CALL VOLUME

As customers have begun to respond to "Disconnection For Non-Payment" (i.e., posting notices/door hangers), requests for payment arrangements have increased significantly. This increase in requests for payment arrangements has affected call wait times due to the care and attention to detail these calls require.

The City has hired new staff to fill vacant positions, which will allow the division (over time, with training) to more expeditiously respond to customer needs. Senior staff have been engaged in the training of new staff, as well as the Tyler Munis utility billing system implementation, which continues to impact the division's ability to respond quickly to inquiries that require special attention.

PLANNING UPDATES

• The property formerly occupied by Mo's Music (115-121 N. Harbor Blvd) has been purchased by tech company **DreamHost** for their new headquarters in Fullerton. DreamHost is a website hosting business with over 20 years of experience that provides web design, site management, marketing, and web development. DreamHost is working with Community Development staff to review their interior improvements and any related permitting.

• Staff continues to review **Short Term Rental** (STR) applications and is nearing the 100 whole-home STR cap. To date, staff has reviewed and approved 95 whole-home rentals and 13 partial-home rentals.

HOUSING

Housing Rehabilitation

- The first home improvement grant of the fiscal year was completed. The grant includes a new roof, exterior paint, and a new water heater.
- Currently there are two ongoing projects.
- Three new projects will be put out for bid at the end of August.

Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA)

- One applicant was provided rental assistance this month through the Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP) for residents affected by COVID-19. Funding is still available.

Hurricane Hilary

- On Monday, August 21, a 91-year-old resident called because his house was flooded during the storm. Housing staff member, Noemi Verhelst, went above and beyond her duties to make sure he received assistance. Noemi was able to contact adult protective services and provide them with his information so that they would be able to assist him.

CAPER (Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report)

- Staff is preparing the 2022-2023 CAPER for public review starting September 11. The CAPER covers Federal grants and how/where the City expended those funds. Programs include Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME, HOME-ARP, and CDBG-CV. In addition, the plan includes information on the homeless in the area, barriers to housing, and other information.

HOME – American Rescue Plan (HOME-ARP)

- Staff will be meeting with ten representatives from various agencies who provide services for homeless residents and victims of domestic violence. The purpose of the meeting will be to explore the possibility of using HOME-ARP funds to provide rental assistance to both groups of residents.

Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG FY 21) Project Complete

The Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus, or SCBA, is a foundational tool that provides the greatest amount of airway protection from toxic gas and harmful particulates resulting from fire fighting and hazardous material incidents. Each device is custom fit to each firefighter to ensure maximum face coverage and tested annually.

Fullerton Fire Department received a grant from the Assistance to Fire Fighters Grant FY21 to replace our SCBA refill station and just completed installation! The SCBA Refill Station is at FFD HQ and allows all air supply bottles to be refilled on site and for crews to remain ready for their next alarm. The City of Fullerton and Fullerton Fire Department is committed to keeping firefighters safe and well.

TROPICAL STORM HILLARY

Department Incident Response

As of midday Sunday, storm Hilary made landfall in northern Baja around 11 a.m. weakening along as it made its way towards California. Eventually, the storm moved towards the desert region and eventually Nevada. However, with a wide path, the storm brought strong wind and rain that affected the City of Fullerton.

The City experienced several hours of rain for a daily total of approximately 2.4 inches with winds of 20 miles per hour and stronger gusts. In response to the approaching storm on Friday, Public Works acted preemptively to prepare for Tropical Storm Hilary. Below is a timeline of the events that took place.

Friday, August 18, 2023

- Streets Division set-up sandbagging station at the CNG Station adjacent to the Yard and restocked materials for additional sand and sandbags.
- Water Operation Division fortified major water facilities with sandbags to ensure protection in case of major flooding; this included water wells and water treatment facilities.

Saturday, August 19, 2023

- Streets Division continued to assist with the sandbagging station and restocking of materials from various local vendors, inspected city drain and channels for any blockage or debris, and performed operation checks at seven (7) pumphouses.
- Traffic congestion took place as more vehicles queued in for sandbags. The department eventually moved the Sandbagging Station and created three different pick-up spots in the lot behind the CNG Station to improve the speed of queuing up. Additionally, the crew set up traffic control to direct the flow of vehicles and avoid congestion.
- Water Operation Division activated additional on-call staff to work on an 8-hour shifts to respond to emergencies.

Sunday, August 21, 2023

- Staff activated the Department Operations Center (DOC)
- Streets Division continued to assist with the sandbagging station and restocking of materials and installed flooded signs at various locations throughout the City.
- Tree Maintenance received 90 plus calls related to trees.
 - A total of six (6) whole trees were knocked down due to the storm
 - Three of those resulted in minor to moderate structure damage (2 cars, 1 house)

Monday, August 22, 2023

- Trees and Street Maintenance continued to work on tree related limb pickups.
- Water Operations responded to several water main breaks and failed booster pumps.



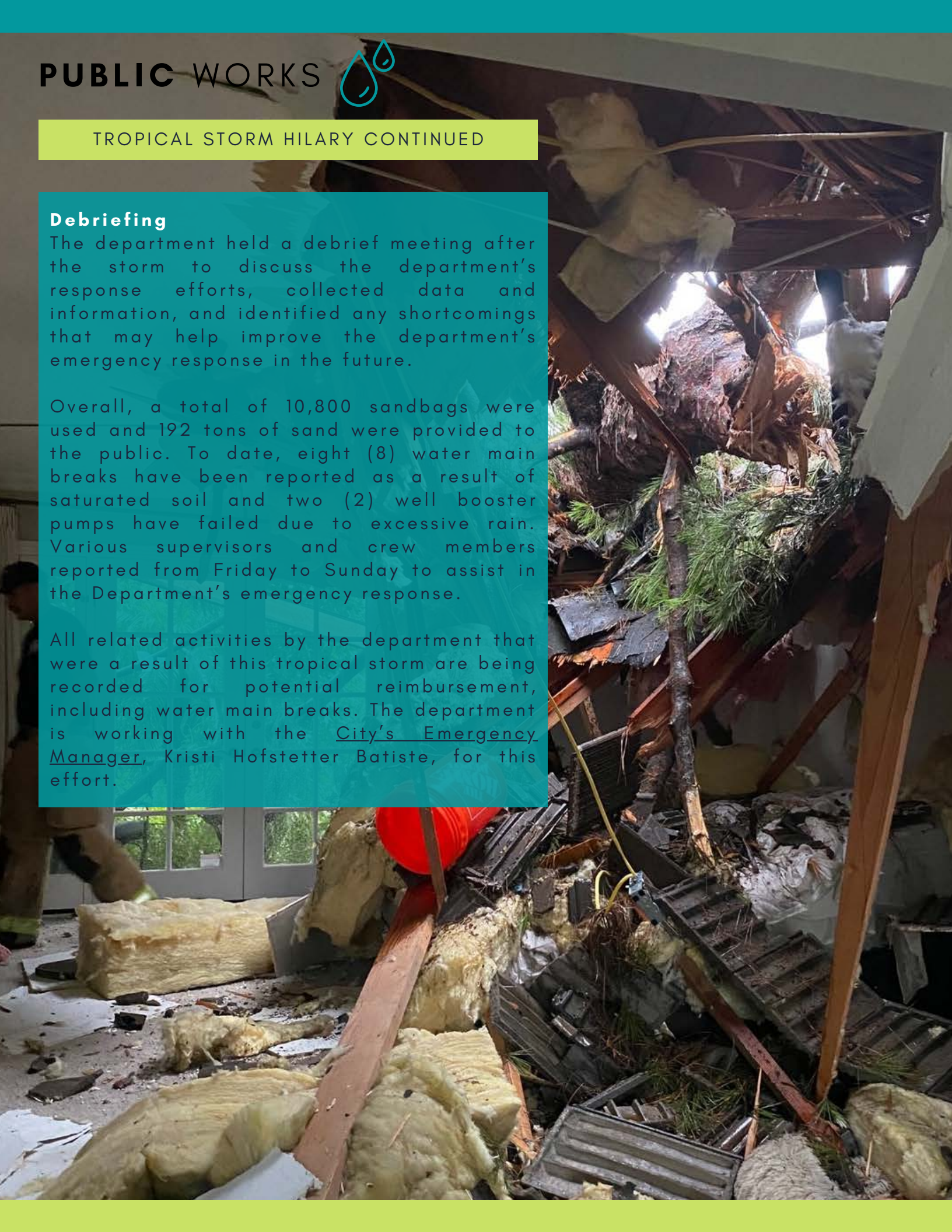
TROPICAL STORM HILARY CONTINUED

Debriefing

The department held a debrief meeting after the storm to discuss the department's response efforts, collected data and information, and identified any shortcomings that may help improve the department's emergency response in the future.

Overall, a total of 10,800 sandbags were used and 192 tons of sand were provided to the public. To date, eight (8) water main breaks have been reported as a result of saturated soil and two (2) well booster pumps have failed due to excessive rain. Various supervisors and crew members reported from Friday to Sunday to assist in the Department's emergency response.

All related activities by the department that were a result of this tropical storm are being recorded for potential reimbursement, including water main breaks. The department is working with the City's Emergency Manager, Kristi Hofstetter Batiste, for this effort.

CA RESOURCE RECOVERY ASSOCIATION CONFERENCE

The **Solid Waste & Recycling Team** attended the 47th Annual California Resource Recovery Association (CRRA) Conference from August 13th - 16th. Major Legislations discussed at the conference for continued and/or closer consideration highlighted examples of implementation strategies, and best management practices.



Some of the legislations featured included Senate Bill 1383 (SB 1383) geared towards organic waste reduction and Senate Bill 54 (SB 54), passed by Governor Newsom on June 30, 2022, which stipulates goals of reduction, recyclability, and compostability of plastic packaging and single-use plastics by 2032 requiring local jurisdictions to comply with a future specified collection and recycling state-mandated program towards building a circular economy. Also mentioned was the Advanced Clean Fleets regulation, adopted in April 2023 by the California Air Resources Board (CARB) to meet California's health-based air quality standards and greenhouse gas emission reduction goals through requiring a Public Fleet to adopt an increasing percentage of zero-emissions vehicles based on truck type and use.

The Solid Waste & Recycling Team will continue to work towards SB 1383 compliance efforts, participate in CalRecycle SB 54 informal and formal rulemaking workshops to obtain information and provide comments that will consider the City of Fullerton in the process, and meet with Public Fleet stakeholders to relay requirements and offer assistance with compliance.

ASSOCIATED ROAD-STREET RECONSTRUCTION

The projects was split into several phases.

- The first two phases were water main replacement and pavement rehab between Yorba Linda to Bastanchury, which is nearly complete.
- The next phase is a separate contract/contractor, which include water main, sewer main replacement from Rolling Hills to Imperial and road rehab between Bastanchury to Imperial.

The utility work is underway and expected to be completed in mid-late September. Concrete work and paving will follow, with an expected completion in mid-late November.

NUTWOOD ATP PROJECT

The improvements on Nutwood include lane reduction, median modification, pavement rehabilitation, traffic signal modification, installation of a combination of bikeways (buffered Class II bike lanes, Class I bike path, bike roundabout, & protected Class IV bikeway), including connection of CSUF bike network.

NUTWOOD ATP PROJECT CONTINUED

Project Summary:

The project closes the number one priority gap to increase connectivity on the Brea-CSUF-Santa Ana River Trail by implementing pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure along Nutwood Avenue to cross under State Route 57 (SR-57). The SR-57 interchanges at Nutwood Avenue provide primary access to two universities, with a combined student enrollment, faculty, and staff of 44,000. The Project connects several large residential developments with sizable student populations and shopping on the east side of SR-57 with the campuses, Downtown Fullerton, and employment centers on the west side of SR-57. The project removes current impediments for pedestrians, and plans for a future pedestrian and bicycle bridge crossing Nutwood Avenue.

This project will create nearly a mile of new Class 1 bike path, Class 2 buffered bike lanes, and Class IV raised bikeways on both sides of Nutwood Avenue where there are currently only Class 3 bike routes. Class 1 bike path and Class IV bikeways will be the first in Fullerton, allowing students, faculty, and staff to safely travel along this portion of Nutwood Avenue to connect to the Campus bike path. Project will also widen SR-57 underpass by cutting into existing slopes and installing retaining walls; constructing raised Class IV bikeways, wider sidewalks; ADA ramp improvements; and adding conflict zone markings at intersections and driveways.

Expected Benefits:

Annual reduction of 118,000 Vehicle Miles Traveled and 840 million tons of Greenhouse Gas Emissions

Environmental justice for the disadvantaged community living nearby

Increases number of walking and bicycle trips

Improves safety for motorized and non-motorized users

Improves physical and mental health

Funding:

The total grant is for \$7,140,400.

Preliminary Engineering = \$450k

Right of way/utility = \$85k

Construction = \$6,305,400

Const. Engineering = \$300k

Total = \$7,140,400

State funds = \$6.988million

Local Match = \$152k

Schedule:

Next step is to coordinate with Caltrans Local Assistance to obtain authorization for Preliminary Engineering (PE). This authorization allows us to collect reimbursement for design services. In parallel, staff will be developing a request for proposals (RFP) for those services.

We anticipate completing design in 2025 and construction in 2026.

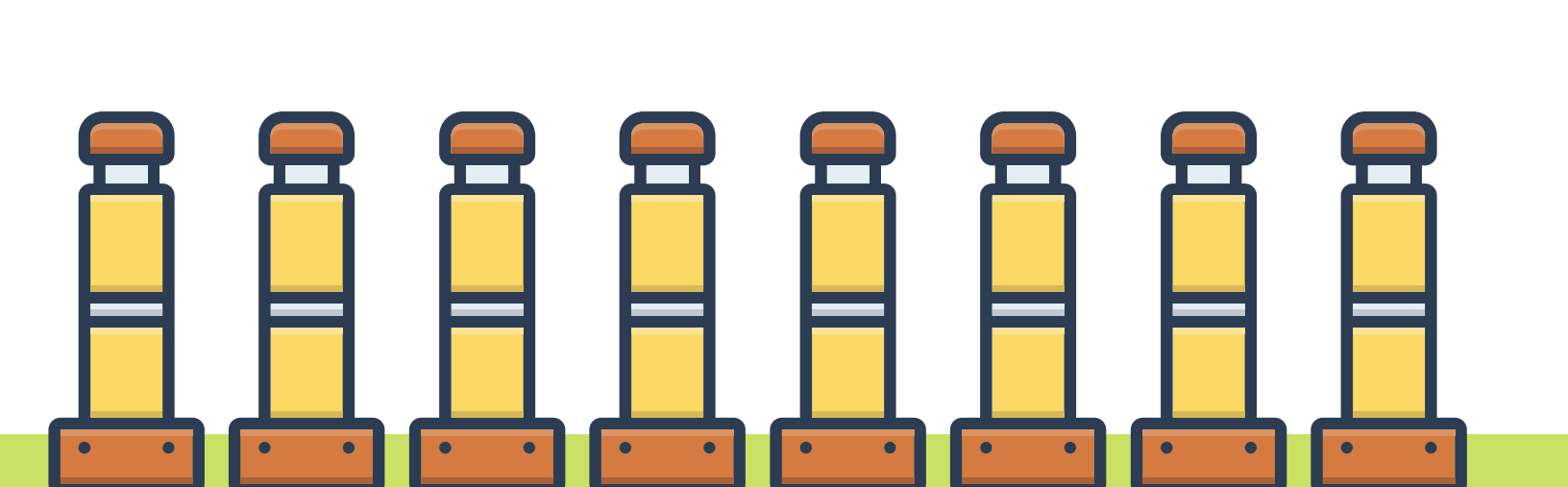
Staff will continue to coordinate with CSUF and Caltrans throughout the process.



WALK ON WILSHIRE UPDATE

In the upcoming weeks, padlock removable bollards will be installed on Wilshire Ave to replace the temporary water-filled barrier that is currently in place. The bollards will quickly and easily restrict access to vehicular traffic while providing a safe space for pedestrian and bicycle traffic. A total of 20 bollards will be installed - 9 directly west of Harbor Blvd and 11 will be installed approximately 200 feet west of Harbor Blvd.

Additional improvements to be installed include new signage and striping throughout the area. A new bicycle signal head consisting of red, yellow and green bicycle symbols will also be installed as part of the project.
