### STREET REHABILITATION PROJECTS

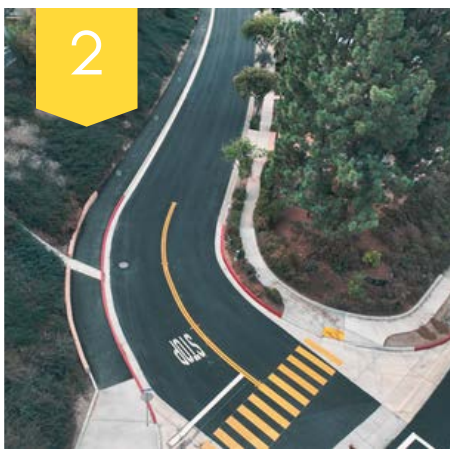
The CIP Division recently completed three street rehabilitation projects adjacent to our local schools and CSUF. The projects were programmed to be constructed during the summer months to avoid impacts to school activities and the associated traffic volumes and were completed on time and before the start of school. The three projects were:

1. Barris Drive adjacent to Golden Hill Elementary
2. Morelia Avenue adjacent to Laguna Road School and Juanita Cooke Trail
3. Associated Road between Yorba Linda Blvd and Bastanchury Rd - near the north entrance to CSUF

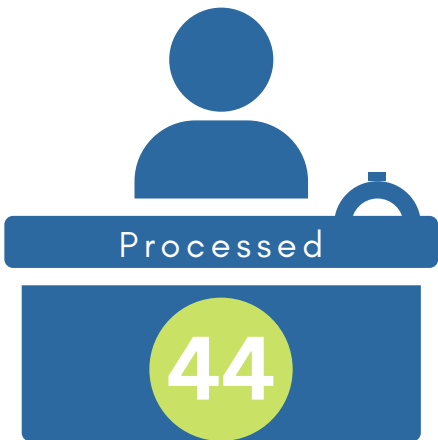
# ADMINISTRATION

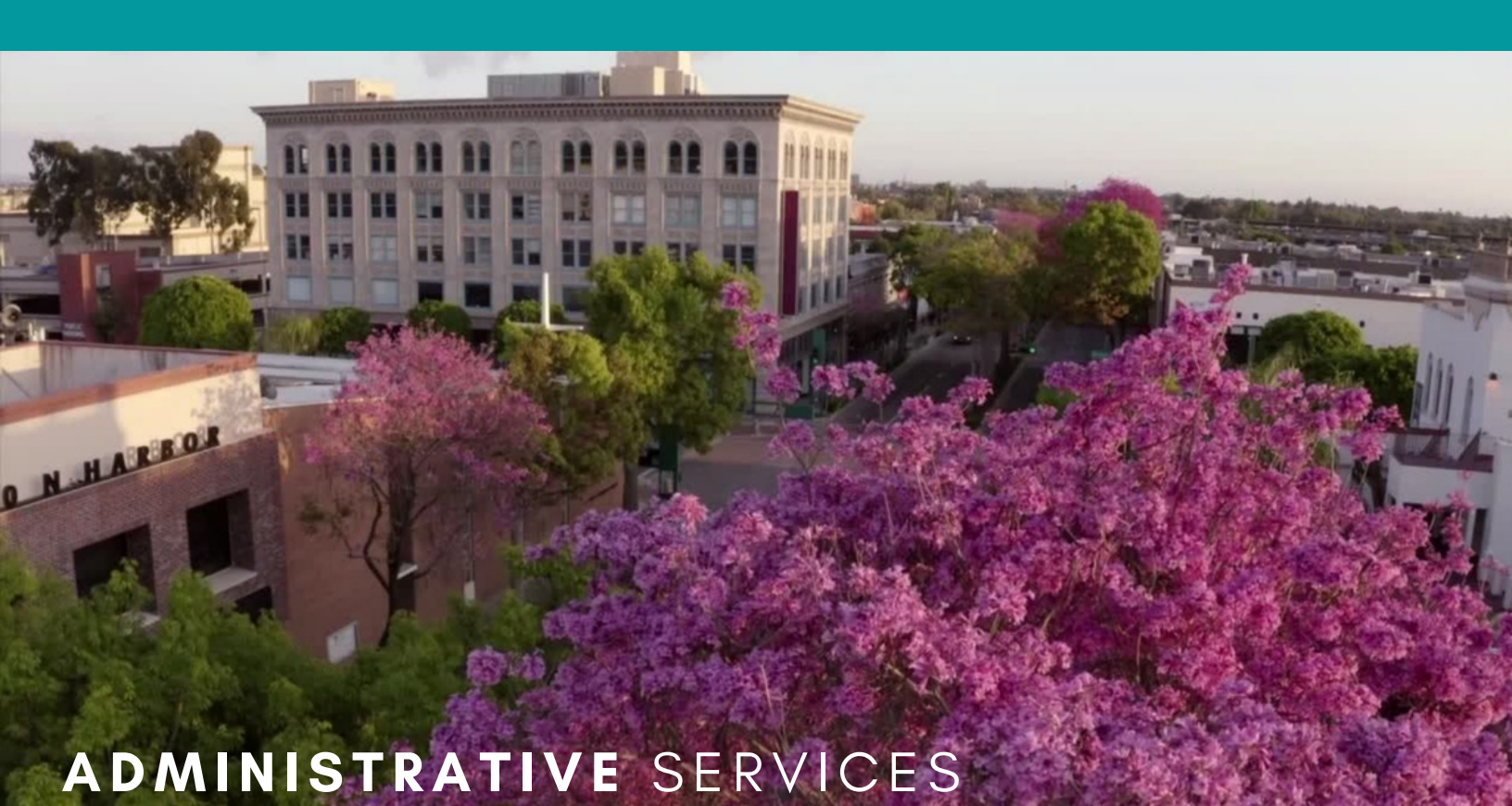

## COMMUNITY AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

### BUILDING AND SAFETY

We will be shifting to automated Solar Rooftop Residential Permitting by September 30th, 2023 in accordance to the Senate Bill 379.

In the coming weeks, the City will be implementing SOLAR APP+, a residential rooftop solar automated permitting system. We are also rolling out email notifications on plan check and improving our turnaround times across all reviews across departments. We hope to have several automated online permits available before the year-end, including mechanical, electrical, and plumbing permits.

### HOUSING

Housing Rehab has 3 ongoing projects, one set to start in October, 2 projects will be going out to bid by the end of this month.

HUD has released a total of \$675,000 for 2023/2024 Street Reconstruction and Park Improvements within Fullerton City limits.

The CAPER is currently available for review and under comment period and will be submitted to HUD on September 28.

### PLANNING

**The Axe Lair** at 109 E. Commonwealth Avenue recently opened in the former Green Place plant shop. The business features nine lanes for ax throwing which are separated by heavy gage metal fencing. The operators will provide instructions to newcomers and ax-throwing will be limited to patrons 12 years of age and older. Pre-packaged snacks and drinks will be available for purchase.

**Lagos Mexican Restaurant** at 139 W. Santa Fe Avenue opened on Friday, September 22, 2023. The new restaurant, built from the ground up, will feature fine Mexican cuisine and will have both in-door and outdoor seating. Beautiful artwork adorns the walls and entryways to the restaurant. We wish them the best of luck in their grand opening!

## PLANNING CONTINUED

The Initial Study for the **Housing Incentive Overlay Zone** was recently posted for a 30-day public review commencing on September 8, 2023. Over 400 emails were sent to interested individuals and local/state/federal agencies providing a link to the document and instructions for providing comments. A scoping meeting will be conducted via Zoom on September 28, 2023 - instructions are posted on the City website and on the notice that was sent out.

## ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

CED successfully hosted our first **Small Business One-Stop-Shop** event on September 14th, 2023. We are grateful to the 70+ local business representatives who RSVP'd alongside our resource partners who helped make this possible. Local businesses benefitted from free consulting services from SBDC along with face-to-face interactions with staff and state agency representatives. City staff also gained insight into community concerns and priorities so we can better focus our attention on identified local needs.



CED staff, in partnership with our Public Works Team also submitted for a **CleanCA Transit grant** to enhance the Fullerton Transportation Center. The grant submittal seeks to fund over \$1M in maintenance and beautification efforts at the transportation center, one of OC's highest ridership station. If awarded, funding will support beautification, security, micro mobility, and wayfinding throughout the area.

We are kicking off a new series of **Small Business Meet and Greet** with our Community and Economic Development Director and staff starting on September 28th through April 2024. **As quoted by the LA Times as having some of the "best world-class coffee destinations in the region"**, we'll be rotating our locations at different local coffee shops throughout the city every other week. These meet ups are a great opportunity for small business operators from any industry to meet city staff, network, share concerns and ideas, and ask questions! Our first session was held on September 28th from 9-10 am hosted by **Play Coffee**, in Downtown SOCO district.





## CODE ENFORCEMENT

### Cannabis Enforcement

On August 15, 2023, Code Enforcement assisted by the Building Division and PD closed **two illegal cannabis dispensaries**: 2605 West Orangethorpe Avenue and 406 East Commonwealth Avenue. Both illegal businesses were closed upon staff discovering operations were run by business owners who owned a dispensary at 2007 Raymer, previously abated through a court order. Code Enforcement prepared documents to assist the Deputy City Attorney in petitioning for expedited abatement warrants. The court issued the abatement warrant and this allowed for staff to close the dispensaries faster, as these business owners had been provided the legally required due process. The business at 2605 West Orangethorpe was closed within one and a half months of discovery and 406 East Commonwealth in less than a month.

Code Enforcement is currently collaborating with the California Department of Cannabis Control (CDCC). The state agency reached out to the City to join efforts given they would raid/close the businesses only to find the business reopened within an hour of the raid. The CDCC has other authorities not afforded to the City and can seize property and cash from what is an illegal cash business. The agency is appreciative of the City's assistance with being able to terminate electrical power and Red tag the buildings in which these businesses operate.

Most of the time, once a building is Red-tagged, it is posted unsafe to enter and PD can arrest anyone breaking the Red tag; however, the business owner at 2605 West Orangethorpe, broke into the unit twice to operate with generators. PD was able to secure a warrant and confiscate products and generators. Code Enforcement and the Building Division responded, and the Red Tag placards were affixed to the building each time. The property owner was instructed to secure his commercial site.

As of September 20, 2023, both sites remain closed, and the property owners must still obtain all required permits to restore the site to the last permitted condition. Once the sites are in compliance, staff will prepare cost recovery pursuant to the municipal code to recover all abatement costs incurred to close these businesses.







### **Sidewalk Vendor Enforcement**

Currently, Code Enforcement staff conducts enforcement on Sidewalk Vendors only upon receipt of a complaint and will work with Orange County Health to enforce the closure of the confirmed unpermitted food businesses. Sidewalk vendors are allowed to operate after obtaining all required permits.

In response to an increased number of complaints, Code Enforcement assisted by the Public Works Division partnered up with Orange County Health Department to conduct inspections on Thursday, September 14, 2023; Friday, September 15, 2023; and Saturday, September 16, 2023. It should be noted that OC Health also received an increased number of vendor complaints.

Ten vendors were found operating without permits on September 14 and September 15, 2023:

On both nights, Code Enforcement staff provided verbal Notice of Violation and educational information and the OC Health Department issued notices to impound all product and equipment. The operators were informed regarding the process of retrieving the items.

On Saturday, September 16, 2023, the team canvassed the City and found no vendors were operating.

## FPL Celebrates 50 Years of Local History Preservation!

The Local History Room opened its doors to the public in 1973, thanks to a generous donation from Lulu Launer as a tribute to her late husband Albert's many years of community service. Collecting, cataloging, and organizing were the priority for the first Local History Librarians. It wasn't long before the collection outgrew the cramped quarters at the library and as part of the 2011 Fullerton Library renovation, the collection moved into its new, state-of-the-art, climate-controlled facility that doubled the square footage of the old room and improved public visibility.

The collection has changed a lot since 1973, moving from the self-serve, browsing model to more of a rare material, special collection archive. Advanced digital technology has allowed the library to make the collection available to researchers near and far, while protecting the original documents for generations of Fullertonians to come. Patrons can now research their family history using the city directories that are available through the library's website, 3rd graders can pull pictures of historic people and places from our Pinterest page and history buffs can follow us on Facebook, inquiring and commenting on new additions to the collection.

On September 19, we threw open our doors for an Open House. Over 75 community leaders and library patrons were on hand to help us celebrate our 50 years of service, browsing unique memorabilia, searching digital resources, and connecting with other history-loving community members.

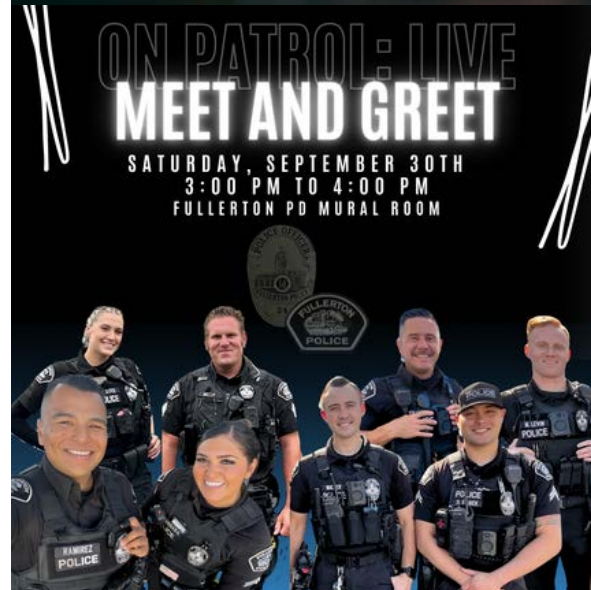

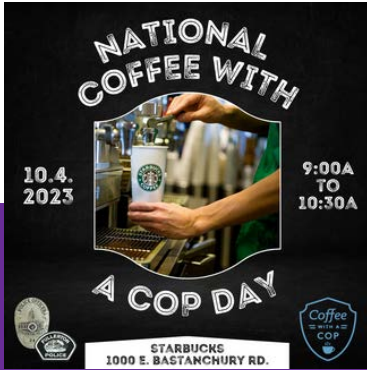

### See Something, Say Something

# INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

In August, we saw an increase in the number of staff that completed their monthly KnowBe4 training. Good work! Security awareness training is a critical part of our overall security program. The learning modules selected each month are tailored to real threats we observe here in Fullerton, and the modules are always very informative. Please complete your assigned security training each month!

Over the past month, the IT department was preparing for the power shutoff at City Hall, which took place on September 15. The shutoff was necessary to allow the new electric vehicle chargers to be connected to the City Hall electrical system. Among other things, the preparatory IT work involved backing up critical systems, engaging vendors that support various systems in the data center, preparing contingency plans if certain equipment did not restart properly, and identifying the optimal shutdown and startup sequences for all applications and services.

Final backups were taken on Thursday evening, September 14. At 2:00am on Friday, September 15, the team began shutting down applications and servers. By 6:15am, the data center was completely powered down. A short affecting the uninterruptable power supply (UPS) required that a replacement part be obtained as quickly as possible. This part was installed by a vendor by 6:15pm on Saturday, after which the startup work could commence. By 1:00am Saturday, critical IT services were back online. Thanks to all involved in this significant effort!





## PUBLIC WORKS

### CITY OF FULLERTON MAIN PLANT PFAS WATER TREATMENT PLANT

In partnership with Orange County Water District (OCWD), the City of Fullerton is constructing a new water treatment plant to treat per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances from Well 3A, which is located at its wellfield site, Main Plant. The new treatment plant consists of granular activated carbon vessels, backwash facilities, new pumps, electrical improvements, and site work. Construction started in November 2022 and is expected to reach substantial completion in December 2023.

### SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLING OPERATIONS AND COMPLIANCE UPDATE

Contract negotiation efforts with Republic Services are still ongoing and may be delayed beyond November 2023 due to a recent change in Executive Management within the Orange County office. The Solid Waste and Recycling Team continue to work with the City's consultant HF&H to monitor and enforce the hauler's contract requirements through a series of action items set in place to find streamlined solutions to current operational challenges.

The City's SB 1383 CalRecycle Corrective Action Plan (CAP) compliance efforts are progressing successfully. The state enforcement representative overseeing this bill is impressed with the tasks being accomplished within a relatively short period of time. There are still remaining actions that the City must implement in order to fully comply by the March 2024 due date. Further intentions towards compliance include advancing initiatives within the City's control until negotiations with Republic Services are finalized.



# PUBLIC WORKS

## REMOVAL OF TRASH DEBRIS & WEEDS AT CALTRANS PROPERTY

This **Landscape Maintenance** contract, established between The Saylor Group and the City of Fullerton, in partnership with the **Department of Transportation** through the Clean California Program, has been operational for the past two months. During this period, notable improvements have been made, from litter control to weed abatement. The contractor collects an average of ten bags of litter and trimmings per job site. It's worth noting that this contract remains in effect for the duration of one year, concluding in June 2024. The subsequent images provide a visual representation of the enhancements achieved within the Caltrans area.

## SIFI UPDATE

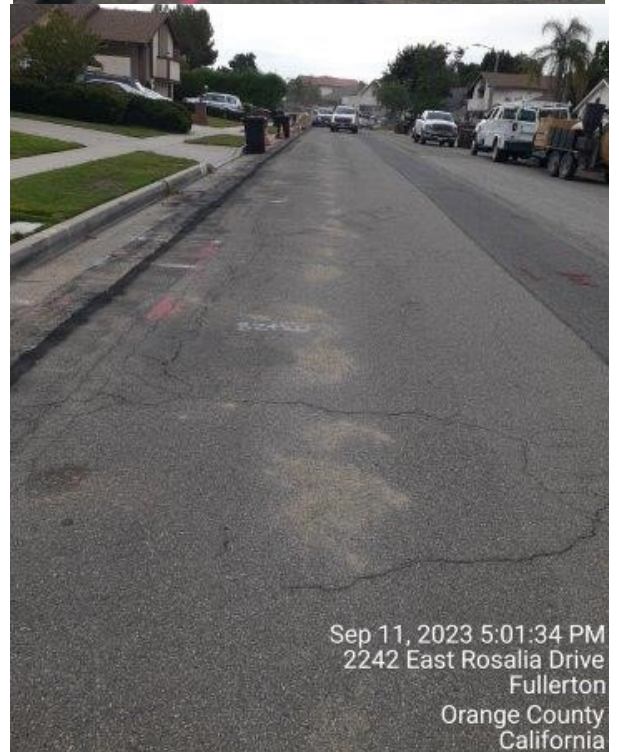
**SiFi's** contractors continue to work throughout the City. Permits have been issued for Work Zone 6a/6b, Work Zone C, Work Zone D, and Work Zone F. Staff suspended Work Zone F permit due to one of SiFi's contractors' failure to complete Work Zone D by the agreed date of 9/19/2023. As such, no work shall occur in Work Zone F until the reinstatement of all trenching is completed in Work Zone D.

Staff is not issuing any additional permits until SiFi's contractors address all open permits, outstanding repairs, public concerns, outstanding invoices, etc. They have failed to prioritize our requests and are now pressuring staff to issue a permit for the next work-zones (large area of the City). This item will elevate to Council and/or City Manager. We strongly request support for withholding additional permits until most outstanding items are addressed. If they receive another work-zone permit, the list of unfinished repairs will continue to build, and we will lose track/control of the situation. ***To the right are some images of the poor workmanship we recently rejected.***

## HIGH-SPEED RAIL SURVEY

The **California High-Speed Rail Authority** (CHSRA) is currently conducting environmental studies to support the development of an EIR/EIS for the Los Angeles to Anaheim Project Section. As part of these studies, CHSRA will be conducting architectural field survey work at properties adjacent/in close proximity to the BNSF Railway/MetroLink/LOSSAN rail corridor in the City of Fullerton.

The survey will take place within the public right-of-way and will consist of taking pictures of buildings while team members walk and/or drive the corridor. Team members will not access private property or engage with occupants. We anticipate work will take place from Tuesday, September 26 through Wednesday, September 27.
