The Fullerton Firefighters Association Local 3421 and the Fullerton Fire Department are proudly supporting **Pinktober** from October 1st-31st, 2023.

Members of the Fullerton Fire Department will be wearing pink work t-shirts during the month of October to raise awareness to the threat of cancer. Cancer is the most dangerous threat to a Firefighter's health and safety today and caused 66% of the career Firefighter line-of-duty deaths from 2002 to 2019, according to the International Association of Fire Fighters (IAFF). This year, the Fullerton Fire Department hosted a Fill-the-Boot fundraising event on **Saturday, October 14th from 9:00 am - 12:00pm** at the intersection of Harbor and Orangethorpe. The event is in recognition of retired Fullerton Fire Department Assistant Chief Larry Greene who served the City for 30 years and is currently battling Stage 3-prostate cancer. Chief Greene who is undergoing cancer treatment at St. Jude Medical Center in Fullerton requested that all fundraised monies go to the St. Jude Memorial Foundation, Crosson Cancer Institute to continue their outstanding research and treatment of cancer patients. 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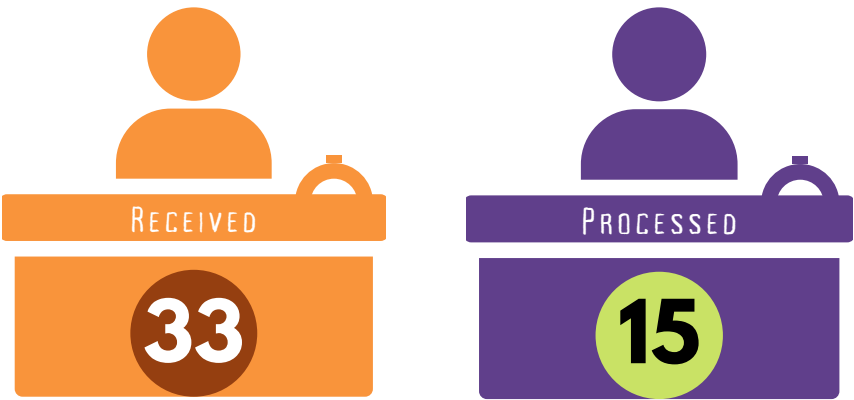

CITY CLERK UPDATES

The City Clerk's Office received 33 public records requests and processed 15 public records requests, between September 21st and October 4th, as required under the **California Public Records Act**.



COYOTE MEETING

On **Sunday, October 1st**, City Manager’s office staff and Fish and Wildlife met with a group of residents in the Richman Knoll, Green Acres, Rodeo, Valencia Mesa and Fox Drive neighborhood in Fullerton to discuss an increase in coyote sightings, coyote dens, and coyote encounters. The sudden increase in these incidents is likely related to a disturbance in coyote habitat or the presence of new litters in coyote pups.

During the meeting, Fish and Wildlife provided education on coyote behavior and habitation in urban areas, answered questions, and provided information about how residents can protect themselves and their pets. City Manager, Eric Levitt, also spoke to the group and outlined the City’s role in responding to coyote concerns, answered questions about City enforcement and codes, and informed residents of the City’s next steps in response to the increases in coyote activity.



Over the next few months, City staff will be working with Fish and Wildlife and OC Animal Care to explore the adoption of a volunteer Wildlife Watch Program and to develop a comprehensive Coyote Management Plan. The plan will help inform the public and provide guidance in dealing with coyotes in Fullerton. The goal is to have the Coyote Management Plan in place and readily available for the public before the **Spring of 2024**, when coyote activity typically starts to increase.

COMMUNITY AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

BUILDING AND SAFETY

CED has partnered with the **National Renewable Energy Laboratory** (NREL) and **SolarAPP+**. This partnership has allowed us to pilot a permit automation system that eliminates plan-check for residential solar systems. Rather than waiting for plan review times, this system automatically issues permits and allow qualified applicants to immediately call for inspection. This efficiency enhancement is one of many steps we are taking to futureproof Fullerton and make permitting easier.

HOUSING

Housing Rehabilitation

The Housing Division is seeking new contractors to add to the list of approved contractors for the Housing Rehabilitation Program. Two new contractor applications have been received. One application has been approved and the second one is under review.

Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP)

One applicant was provided rental assistance in September through the Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP) for residents affected by COVID-19. Funding is still available.

CAPER (Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report)

The CAPER is an annual report submitted to HUD that describes the City's expenditures and accomplishments with Federal grants. Federal programs include Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME, HOME-ARP, and CDBG-CV. In addition, the plan includes information on the homeless in the area, barriers to housing, and other information. The 2022-2023 CAPER (July 1, 2022 – June 30, 2023) was submitted to HUD by the September 28th deadline.

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)

A technical (mandatory) meeting for all non-profits interested in applying for 2024-2025 CDBG funding was held on Tuesday, October 17.

CODE ENFORCEMENT

Sidewalk Vendor Enforcement

In response to resident complaints submitted to both agencies, Code Enforcement staff continues to work with the Orange County Health Department to enforce the closure of unpermitted food businesses.

Over the past month, Code Enforcement assisted by the Public Works Maintenance Sewer Division and Fullerton Police Department partnered up with Orange County Health to conduct periodic inspections and canvas the City to close unpermitted vendors and provide information and education on how they can operate safely. Code Enforcement staff provides verbal Notice of Violation and educational information, and OC Health issues notices to impound all products and equipment. The operators are informed regarding the process of retrieving the items.

Over the course of four weeks, staff has closed 20 non-duplicated vendors that were operating without permits. A few of these vendors were closed several times at different locations; however, it has been noted that the number of unpermitted vendors has decreased. Several night inspections were conducted last week. Staff found no vendors operating in the City. Staff will continue to coordinate random inspections through the end of December 2023.

Code Enforcement Providing Resources to Assist Residents

Over the last several years, Code Enforcement staff continued to get complaints on a property for property maintenance issues that we were unable to close due to the property owners unwillingness to accept assistance. At times, the corrections our staff provided were made and the case would be closed; however, months or a year later Code Enforcement staff would receive another complaint and the cycle would repeat.

Most recently, Felipe Pineda, the officer assigned to a case, was able to build rapport with the property owner and managed to get the property owner to finally accept assistance.

Our staff is not able to provide referrals; however, we work closely with OC United who helps residents with Code Enforcement cases who are not able to physically or financially make the required corrections. This agency helps Fullerton residents in need throughout the year. If both parties are open to it, we provide each of them with their contact information and are able to connect residents with OC United so they may decide the best path forward.

For this specific property, the rear yard had hoarding conditions which were affecting the neighboring properties. OC United and the property owner are now working together to make the much-needed clearance and clean-up of the property.

The case is still ongoing but just getting the property owner to accept assistance has been a win!

PLANNING CONTINUED

Planning Staff and our **HIOZ consultants (DUDEK)** completed the public Scoping Meeting for the preparation of the Environmental Impact Report (EIR) on Thursday, September 28, 2023. Comments received from this meeting, as well as any additional comments received by the October 9, 2023, deadline will be analyzed, and responses provided in the EIR. All of this work is being done in preparation for the HIOZ consideration during future Planning Commission and City Council meetings.

Planning Staff provided a presentation on housing development to OC United at their day-long workshop that focused on preventing homelessness on Saturday, September 23, 2023. The presentation provided updates on the various residential projects that were either recently approved, in plan check, or under construction as well as an update to the Housing Element progress. Feedback from the persons in attendance included the desire to provide more affordable units in Fullerton that were in the low and very low-income categories.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

From improving and enhancing permit services to direct on-the-ground business outreach, **CED** continues to move forward in efforts to expand and retain our business landscape. Over the past two weeks, Director Sunayana Thomas and Taylor Samuelson have completed outreach and on-site visits with some of Fullerton's top innovation and biotech companies. Staff recently met with SigmaGraft, a one-of-a-kind synthetic bone bioengineering firm which completes end to end manufacturing and R&D here in Fullerton, and NTS Labs which completed space launch systems testing for NASA's Artemis lunar program right here in Fullerton.

Surplus Land: 799 Rolling Hills

The City Council declared 799 Rolling Hills surplus on August 18, 2020. The City will be releasing a Notice of Availability on October 5th, as required by Gov. Code Section 54220, to sell/lease the surplus property located at 799 Rolling Hills Drive for residential development. The site is approximately 2.4 acres and is zoned R-1-20 with a minimum lot size of 20,000 sq.ft. Applicants will have 60 days to submit a proposal, per Surplus Land Act. It does not obligate the city to sell the property however will require further review to meet the development expectations of the city for residential. ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CONTINUED

The World Korean Business Convention (WKBC) was hosted at the Anaheim Convention Center from October 11, 2023 – October 14, 2023. The convention offered bi-national business collaborations, investments, distributions, and partnership opportunities. 3,500 business leaders including 1,500 Korean entrepreneurs from 60 different countries are expected to attend the convention. The city participated in the event in an effort to create global investment partnerships and bridge interactions between domestic and overseas businesses.

On Thursday, October 12, 2023, the City hosted a bus tour for conference attendees. The Fullerton Highlights Tour attendees were welcomed to a captivating exploration of Fullerton's cultural and historical highlights. Key points of interest included the Fullerton Municipal Airport, Hillcrest Park/Korean War Memorial, Korean Business Center, Goodman Logistics Center, California State University Fullerton, and Downtown Fullerton.

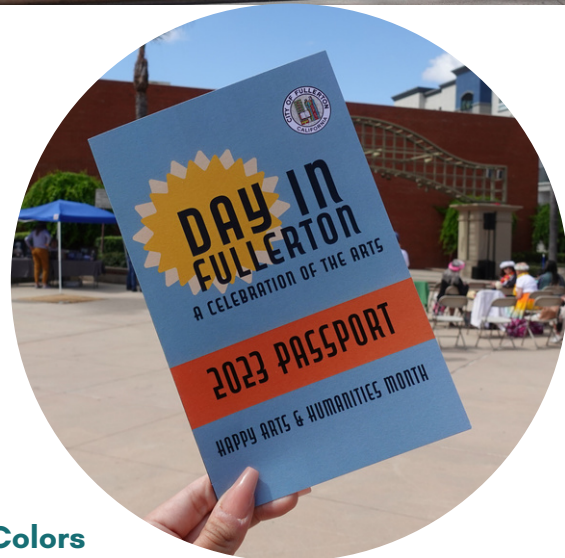

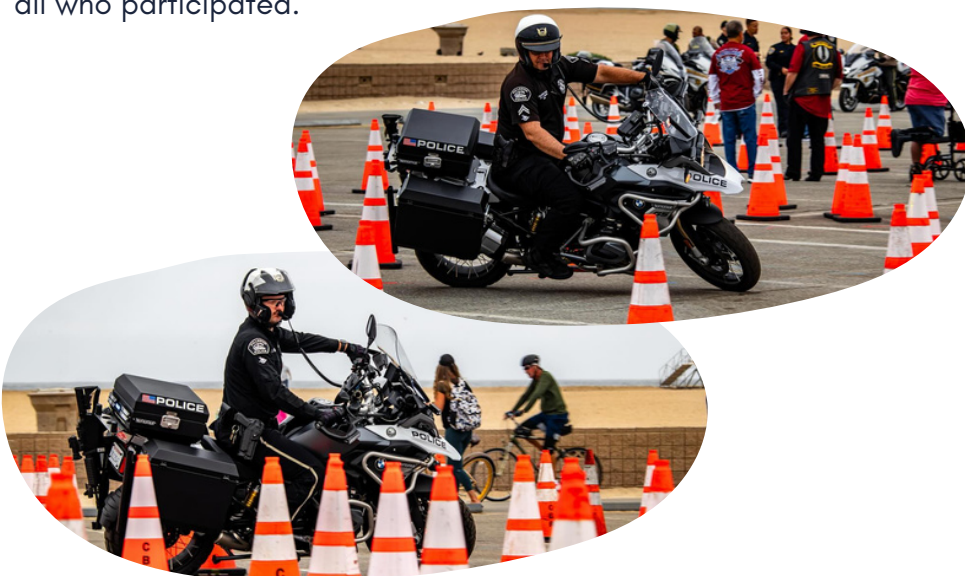
RECENT EVENTS

SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLING

The Solid Waste and Recycling (SW&R) team is prioritizing streamlining operations in the Downtown Fullerton Business Community. Concentrations are being placed on updating the list of active and closed businesses in the area, evaluating waste enclosure areas and waste streams, rightsizing levels of service, analyzing the rate structure, and reeducating businesses on the proper methods of disposal.

In the past few weeks, a focal point has been placed specifically on two downtown block areas where new and additional waste enclosures were constructed off of Amerige Ave, in between Commonwealth Ave and Wilshire Ave. Staff is in preparation of conducting door to door outreach efforts to educate businesses on how to use the new shared waste enclosures by providing a comprehensive Downtown Waste Disposal Guide for business owners/managers, and Downtown Employee Waste Disposal Brochures to share with employees. This type of education is the SW&R Team's first introduction to the city's business community; the goal is to establish relationships to better serve them and set them up for future success.



HUNT LIBRARY UPDATE

Phase III building repairs are nearly complete!

Over the last 9 months, approximately \$3.2 million of State Grant funds were used to renovate and repair the Hunt Library building. The renovations included ADA-compliant restrooms; repairing exterior glass and aluminum storefront system and trim; replacing carpeting; replacing entry doors; replacing ceiling; repairing interior plaster finish and repainting where applicable; replacing HVAC system, plumbing, and electrical (including over 70 receptacles); replacing all lighting with new LED lamps; replacing exterior flood lights; installing new Intelligent Technologies (IT) infrastructure (over 35 data drops and 6 WiFi access points); installing 6 interior and 8 exterior security cameras; rehabilitating exterior courtyards; and a utility ready warming kitchen. The unique architecture and historic designation made revitalizing this building very challenging due to regulatory hurdles, structural issues, high costs, balancing historical accuracy with modern needs, environmental concerns, supply chain difficulties, and unforeseen complications. The building is now state of the art and ready for the public to enjoy for decades to come.

The last phase of the project is the site improvements. This phase is currently under design and anticipated to be complete by February/March of 2024. The site improvements include parking lot reconfiguration, ADA compliance ramps and parking stalls, lighting modifications, dog park modifications, and a new trash enclosure.

WALK ON WILSHIRE UPDATE

In August 2022, Council approved the Walk on Wilshire Parklet Pilot Program. The participating businesses took the necessary steps to obtain permits to construct parklets in the public right-of-way to continue the outdoor dining experience. In parallel, staff completed improvements to the corridor that include removable bollards, signage, striping, and traffic signal modifications; including the first bike signal in Fullerton! The parklet pilot was approved until June 2024, at which time the program will be reevaluated. The participating businesses will bear full cost to construct their respective parklets and pay a monthly lease to use of the public right-of-way.



COFFEE WITH THE PRINCIPAL

On October 3rd, Engineering and Police Department staff attended 'Coffee with the Principal' at Maple Elementary. The focus of the meeting was on pedestrian safety. The City Traffic Engineer, Police Lieutenant - Traffic Bureau, and Public Works Director were on hand to discuss some of the community concerns. The top priority is the intersection of Lemon Avenue and Valencia Avenue. The community is concerned with red-light-running and crossing times. Traffic Engineering has extended the pedestrian crossing times, implemented an all-red interval, and implemented a leading pedestrian interval. There is also a new no-right-turn-on-red restriction for eastbound traffic. We also recently removed some uplifted sidewalk on Valencia Avenue which was also discussed at the meeting. Staff is committed to reevaluate the school as part of a rotating safety assessment. The review is scheduled early 2024.
