UNION PACIFIC TRAIL PHASE TWO

In a unanimous decision on January 16, 2024, the Fullerton City Council, with a 5-0 vote, approved an updated concept for the Union Pacific Trail Phase Two project. This pivotal move reflects the city's dedication to sustainable development and the enhancement of recreational infrastructure, marking a significant step forward.

The revised concept plan for Phase Two aligns seamlessly with the proposed Rail District Specific Plan (RDSP), focusing on transit-oriented development south of the tracks. Envisioned as the Union Pacific Trail and Bike Path, the project aims to create connectivity across neighborhoods, utilizing the former Union Pacific Railroad right-of-way.

Mayor Nicholas Dunlap voiced his support for the updated plan. He stated, "This concept plan represents a holistic approach to community development, aligning with our vision for a sustainable and connected city for bicyclists, pedestrians and families. The approval showcases our commitment to a well-thought-out development that not only provides recreational amenities but also contributes to the long-term growth of our community."

OC ANIMAL CARE LAUNCHING DAILY ADOPTIONS

Last Summer, OC Animal Care launched various pilot programs to understand adoption patterns and trends. Based on the information and data learned from those pilot programs coupled with community interest and feedback received through a variety of communication channels, OC Animal Care will be adjusting its operational model.

Beginning January 17, 2024, OC Animal Care will offer Daily Adoption Options. The shelter will be open daily for Adoption Visits from 11 a.m. - 5 p.m. as well as open for Viewing Hours from 2 - 5 p.m.

OC Animal Care has updated their website with information on operational details, including FAQs and a synopsis of what was learned from their recent pilot programming, including data collected.

A mass email was sent to all residents who added their contact information to a staff-managed list (approximately 400 email addresses) and a notice will be posted to the local newspaper. **A community informational meeting will be held on Thursday, January 25th at 6:30 pm in the Library Conference Center** to discuss changes to the Housing Element document that occurred over the last year. ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

We are excited to share new opportunities for local businesses thanks to our resource partners. The California Competes Tax Credit (CCTC) program has now re-opened through January 22, 2024. The program provides \$164 million in tax credits to our local businesses to support workforce development.

Key aspects of the program include:

- Credit Against Income Tax Due to the Franchise Tax Board
- Non-Refundable
- 6-Tax Year Carryover

The state completes a review of the amount of credit requested and reviews applicants on a cost-benefit ratio.

The assessment is based on aggregate employee compensation plus aggregate investment.

Interested local businesses should schedule a consultation with OCIE SBDC to submit a competitive application to the program.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CONTINUED

The Police Department, Community and Economic Development, Fire Department, and Hope Center hosted a meeting on January 18th at the Fullerton Library Conference Center with local downtown businesses regarding quality of life topics and best practices such as cleanliness, security and safety, access to services, policy, and regulations, etc. This meeting provided an opportunity to share concerns, identify opportunities, and provide resources to create a safe and supportive business environment.

The City of Fullerton is partnering with **Reality Investment Association of California** (RIAOC) to provide an update on real estate, retail, and development activity in the City with local and regional real estate professionals on January 30th from 11:30-2:30 at the Community Center. CED, along with Mayor Dunlap, will present investment opportunities in our city including sale/lease properties, city-owned opportunity sites, and underutilized privately owned sites, and share insights on our updated permitting process.

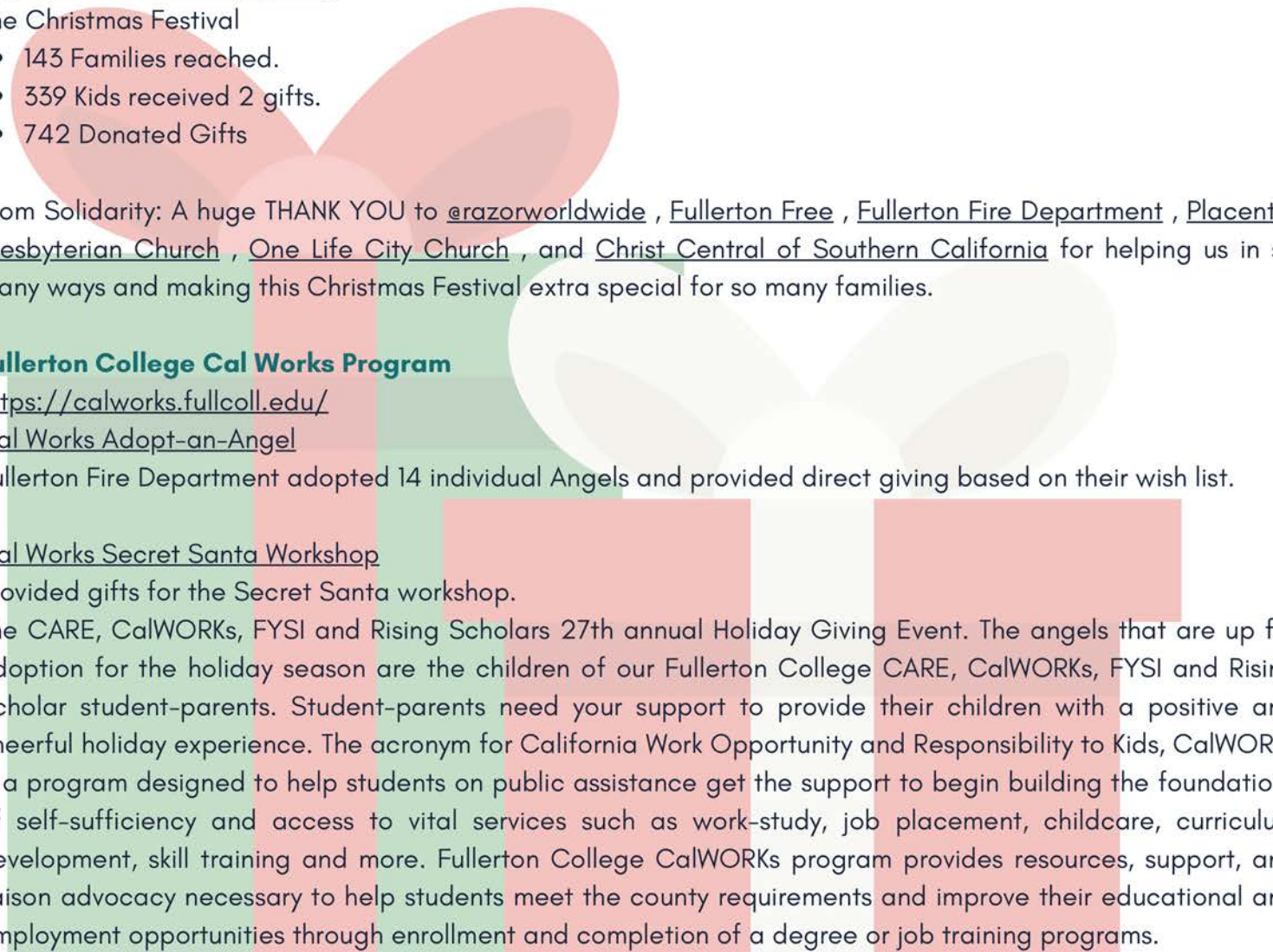

CHECKPOINT



On Friday, December 22nd, Fullerton PD conducted a DUI/Driver's License Checkpoint in the area of Lemon St and Orangethorpe Ave. The deterrent effect of High Visibility Enforcement using DUI checkpoints and DUI Saturation Patrols has proven to lower the number of persons killed and injured in alcohol or drug-impaired crashes. Research shows that crashes involving an impaired driver can be reduced by up to 20 percent when well-publicized proactive DUI operations are conducted routinely. The Fullerton Police Department is committed to taking impaired drivers off the road. Driving under the influence is not only dangerous but also has major consequences, some of which could be life-changing.

Officers were looking for signs of impairment while checking for proper licensing and provided educational materials on the dangers of driving drunk/high, supplied by MADD.

724 vehicles drove through the checkpoint, five of which received citations for driving without a valid license, and two were arrested for driving under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol.

Checkpoint locations are determined based on reported incidents of impaired driving-related crashes.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

OFFICERS SAVE A LIFE

On Sunday, December 24th, at approximately 10:45 PM, Fullerton PD officers were dispatched to the 1200 block of N. Gilbert St. regarding a one-month-old baby not breathing. Upon arrival, officers immediately began performing life-saving measures for the infant. Officers continued CPR for several minutes before the infant began to breathe again. Fullerton Fire responded and continued life-saving measures as they transported the infant to a local hospital for treatment.

Responding to a call of a baby not breathing is one of the most emotional, stressful calls an officer can receive. We are incredibly proud of the responding officers. They are undoubtedly responsible for saving the child's life, giving this family even more reason to celebrate the holiday spirit.

PUBLIC WORKS

LANDSCAPE DIVISION UPDATE

In Fiscal Year 2022-23, the Public Works Department had 20 full-time equivalent (FTE) budgeted Sr. Maintenance Worker positions for the Landscape Maintenance Program. At that time, the maintenance crew followed a schedule where they alternated between parks and center medians every week, taking approximately 4 to 5 weeks to complete maintenance at each park in the city.

To increase productivity and proper care for the City's parks, trails, and medians, City Council approved the Staff's recommendation for an additional eight Sr. Maintenance Worker positions in Fiscal Year 2023-24. After several rounds of recruitment, the Landscape Division now has 25 of their budgeted 28 positions filled. Due to the increased workforce, starting this week the Landscape Division can now efficiently manage both parks and medians on the same day. This adjustment will result in maintenance activities occurring approximately every other week for each park and median, effectively doubling the frequency.

Furthermore, the additional staffing has enabled the establishment of a dedicated crew for general repairs and trail maintenance. This team addresses tasks such as fence repairs, seeding, and trail grading. Acting Landscape and Tree Manager David Bishop noted that the Division can now operate as intended and effectively meet its objectives to better serve the community, one park at a time.
